Do you have a concern about the condition of your road? How about dogs running at large in your neighbourhood? Reporting your issue is just a click away using the web or your phone.

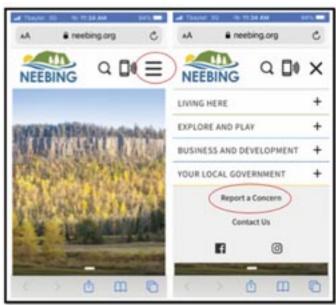
On our **WEBSITE**, click on the Report a Concern link in the upper right-hand corner.

# Ministry of Transportation Beginning Work on Pigeon River Bridge

The Pigeon River Bridge at the Ontario/Minnesota border crossing will be rehabilitated in 2023. Work includes a full deck replacement, including new bridge surfacing, railing replacement, updated lighting and approach grading.

During construction, the bridge will be reduced to a single lane controlled by traffic signals.

The benefits of the project include improved lighting, smoother road surface, extended bridge life and reduction in maintenance upkeep and costs.

Construction is anticipated to begin in April with completion in October.

# Half Load Restrictions in Effect on Neebing Roadways

March 15, 2023

The Municipality of Neebing has restrictions in place prohibiting heavy vehicles on municipal roadways. Effective immediately, half load restrictions have been placed on all municipal roads.

It is normal for spring thaw conditions to warrant weight restrictions on municipal roads. Such restrictions may be imposed at any time when the thaw starts and will continue to be in place until the frost has left the roadbed. Historically, restrictions are in place from approximately mid-March to mid-June annually. Changes in the freeze/thaw patterns may lengthen or shorten this time frame. It is the Working Roads Foreman who will make the call on the duration of the load restrictions. Monitor the Neebing website and Neebing's Facebook page for updates and information on load restrictions.

Except as otherwise permitted under Section 122 of the Highway Traffic Act no person shall operate, or cause to be operated, a vehicle having a weight of greater than 5,000 kilograms per axel on all municipal roads. A link to the Act is available on the Neebing website.

#### Exemptions to the load restrictions include:

- a) vehicles operated by or on behalf of a municipality or other authority having jurisdiction and control of a highway, where the vehicles are engaged in highway maintenance, including the carriage and application of abrasives or chemicals to the highway, the stockpiling of abrasives or chemicals for use on a highway, or the removal of snow from a highway;
- b) vehicles used exclusively for the transportation of milk;
- c) fire apparatus;
- d) vehicles operated by or on behalf of a municipality transporting waste; or
- e) public utility emergency vehicles.

#### What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

Since the March edition, there has been two regular meetings of Council on March 1 and 15, 2023. There was also one Special Council meeting on March 15, 2023.

At the regular Council meeting on March 1st the following matters were considered:

- Council heard a deputation from the Recreation Committee regarding improvements to the Cloud Lake Boat Launch.
- Council reviewed applications for the vacant seat on the Police Services Board
- Council directed Administration to engage the services of a consultant to complete a pay equity review.
- Council reviewed correspondence related to proposed changes to the requirements for camping on water over Ontario's public lands.
- Council passed supporting resolutions relating to school board elections, barriers for women in politics, and homelessness, mental health and opioid addiction.

At the Special Council meeting on March 15th, the Committee of the Whole reviewed two applications for severance. Recommendations to approve the applications were ratified at the regular Council meeting later that evening. At the regular Council meeting on March 15th, the following matters were considered:

- Council directed Administration to opt-in as an operator site for the transition of the blue box program to full producer responsibility.
- Council directed Administration to prepare the necessary by-laws to implement a fire services cost recovery program.
- Council reviewed correspondence related to Highway 608, municipal heritage registers and Bill 5, Stopping Harassment and Abuse by Local Leaders Act.

The next Council meetings will be held on April 5 and 19, 2023. Regular Council meetings are normally scheduled for the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month.

This article contains only highlights from Council meetings – visit the website to see the approved minutes from each of the meetings. The minutes of each meeting are approved at the following meeting and are posted on the website once they have been approved and signed. If you don't have internet capabilities, you can always contact the office for copies of approved minutes.

Meeting agendas are always posted online on the Friday prior to the Wednesday meeting. Come out and see what your Council is doing on your behalf. Feel free to contact the Municipal Office for further information or with input into any of the items that Council is considering. The meetings are now being held at the Municipal Office, but there is the option to attend virtually as well. The links to login to the meetings are posted on our website in the calendar details.

# Neebing Emergency Services by Dale Ashbee, Fire Chief, Neebing Fire Safety during Winter - Spring Transition

As I write, the forecast predicts continuing winter weather for Neebing, with

the expectation of yet another round of snow. However, the calendar confirms that March will soon be gone, and April - the month when winter finally loses its grip – will arrive bringing Spring weather, with its warm days full of the pleasures of gardening, hiking, boating and summer fun to enjoy.

With the transition from Winter to Spring, the loss of snow cover and higher temperatures puts outdoor burning in focus, and the need to be aware of and to take steps to avoid; injury, property loss and wildfire threats from outdoor burning. <u>April 1</u> officially marks the resumption of the 'Fire Season' across the entirety of Northern Ontario and is the day when both provincial and municipal regulations

come into effect to minimize outdoor fire threats throughout the season. During <u>'Fire Season'</u>, open outdoor fires are regulated and even <u>'Restricted'</u> when Fire Hazard (Danger) ratings warrant. Fire season regulations are in effect from April 1 thru to and including October 31st or from April Fool's Day to Halloween, each year, <u>regardless of weather conditions</u>. During Fire Season, Neebing residents are reminded that valid Municipal Fire Permits are required for all open-air burning! The hours of burning (as stated on the Burn Permit) are restricted to a start time of 2 hours <u>before</u> sunset, and all fires must be out by 2 hours <u>after</u> sunrise. Municipal Fire permits are available, on line, free of charge, 24/7, at www.Neebing.org, at the Municipal Office during business hours (9-5 Monday thru Friday), or at local retailers (which include AJs and Green Acres store). Seasonal permits are available for incinerator burning, as well as small cooking and recreational fires. Day permits are required for debris and brush pile burning and are issued for a maximum <u>3-day period</u>. In *Neebing*, open fire burning in the daytime is not allowed throughout the fire season.

April is a great time to reduce the potential spread of fire near your home through the clean-up and disposal of yard debris, thinning of vegetation, and trimming of trees to reduce available fuels (that facilitate rapid fire spread) and ensuring that fire pits and BBQs are both in good repair, and are situated a safe distance from any combustibles. As you work have an eye for additional actions you can take that will reduce the risks of potential wildfire starts, or the encroachment of a fire into the area near your home.

April is also a great month to review available <u>FIRESMART</u> guidelines to assist in recognizing <u>potential fire threats</u> on your property, and <u>fire safe actions</u> that you may take to mitigate those outdoor fire hazards. Check out **Be FireSmart | ontario.ca** to access numerous useful resources that can assist you in identifying and carrying-out 'fire mitigation actions' to help you improve outdoor fire safety on your property.

This month, NES is sharing a couple of additional fire safety reminders derived from observations and lessons learned (or reinforced) during actual fire call responses:

• Smoke /CO Alarms – We are repeatedly reminded that sounding Smoke/CO alarms provide early warning of fire dangers in our homes, allowing our family, time to immediately and safely exit from our home. If an alarm sounds its warning, do not hesitate in getting outside and then calling 911 for assistance. To be safe remain outside until the fire department arrives, checks the home and confirms the reason for the alarm. Make it a habit to check all your alarms monthly to ensure they are working correctly.

• **Fire Extinguishers** – Although you may wonder from time to time whether fire extinguishers are worth having in your home or shop, in recent months, several residents – after calling 911 and ensuring that fire crews were on route – have been able to use a home fire extinguisher to successfully slowdown or stop a small fire. Having a fire extinguisher handy and the situation safe enough to use it significantly reduced the extent of damage that may have resulted if an extinguisher had not been used early on the fire. Watch for and plan to participate in a public 'fire extinguisher' training opportunity planned for the Tailgate Sale this June.

• The 'Separation of Things' – Whether it is ensuring that your fire pit is far enough from fine fuels like dead grass or a shed wall to avert an errant spark or ember from spreading fire to them, or ensuring that your BBQ is not too close to the siding on your house, or the railings on your deck, having some separation (distance) between any <a href="heat sources">heat sources</a> and nearby <a href="com-bustibles">com-bustibles</a> is smart 'fire safe' behaviour". The value of separation can also apply when locating building structures on your property. If too close it is relatively easy for fire in one building to damage or spread to a nearby building. Remember to consider 'The Separation of Things' as you map out your next outbuilding construction project, and be sure you are putting some separation and creating a 'fire break' between the buildings that are important to you.

Virtually all the fires NES responds to are unintentional and unexpected by the surprised property owner. While an unexpected fire is active and growing, is not a good time to wonder what you should have done or could have done to avoid the situation or what you should do now. Rather, before the fire is the time to give thought to what you can do to avoid a fire situation, and to prepare for the possibility of a fire in your home or on your property. Family Home Escape Plans developed and practiced ahead of an emergency give all household members a mental picture of what to do; to help them exit the house quickly, gather at the designated 'safe place' on the property, ensure everyone is accounted for, and to wait for fire fighter assistance. #### Show Me the Money

Big projects require big money.

Each year, Neebing saves some money from property taxes and places it into reserve funds to help finance future projects, and Neebing also receives grants. On the 2023 Draft Neebing budget there are three types of grants:

Unconditional Grants can be used towards anything. The Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund is the largest grant of this type Neebing receives and is generally used to defray some of the expenses associated with provincial services that were downloaded to municipality such as payments to the Thunder Bay District Social Services Board.

Conditional Grants are directed towards a specific purpose. The two largest grants of this type that Neebing receives are the Federal Government's Canada Community Building Fund (which used to be named the Gas Tax Grant) and the Province's Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund. Each of these grants come with details about how they can be used, including large infrastructure projects such as road surface renewal. And both come with specific reporting requirements.

One-Time Grants are typically grants that require an application process, and are focussed on a specific project. Until the grants are approved, and the grant agreements are signed, news regarding these grants is not publicly released. This year the draft budget contains grants that are not yet approved, so that Council can examine various "what-if" scenarios. Neebing expects that when the final version of the budget is passed in May, the results of our grant submissions will be known.

Neebing has received one-time grant funding for Municipal Office renovations, and the replacement of the Farm Road Bridge later this year. Neebing is appreciative of this funding and signage and acknowledgement of these grants will appear in the next issue of Neebing News.

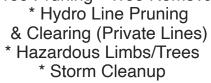

Trails may be slippery due to wet, muddy, icy, and snowy conditions, so be prepared for your visit and wear appropriate footwear. Additionally, LRCA staff do not monitor ice conditions, so proceed with caution and at your own risk.

If you visit our Conservation Areas frequently, consider purchasing an Explore Card Parking Pass. For \$40.00 +HST, this pass will allow you to forgo the \$5.00 per vehicle day use parking fee at all 10 Conservation Areas in the Lakehead Region for one calendar year. #### The Rural Pharmacist: Addiction Treatment (Methadone and Suboxone) and Stigma

√ 1 in 5 people in Canada will have a mental health problem in their lifetime. People with mental use disorder are twice as likely to have a substance use disorder compared to the general population. Similarly, people with substance use disorders are 3 times as likely to have a mental illness. Substance use disorder is a treatable mental health disorder that affects a person's brain or behaviour, leading to their inability to control the use of substances like legal or illegal drugs, alcohol, or medications. Symptoms can be moderate or severe, with addiction being the more severe form of substance use disorder.

Although there has been an increased public conversation about mental health and access to addiction treatment in the recent years, stigma remains a significant barrier to accessing treatment for those

dealing with mental health and/or addiction. Stigma refers to negative attitudes and negative behaviour towards people with substance use and mental health problems. This can include having fixed ideas and beliefs, such as thinking that people with substance use and mental health problems are not normal or not like us; that they caused their own problems. Stigma can prevent someone that is suffering from disclosing their illness to family and friends, asking for help for a health care worker or take part in social activities. This suppression of feelings and illness can cascade into lower self-esteem and more medical issues.

Seven things you can do to reduce stigma and discrimination against people with mental health and substance use problems:

1. Know the facts about mental illness/substance use. Don't believe the myths.

2. Be aware of your attitudes and behaviour. Avoid judgemental thinking.

3. Choose your words carefully. The way you speak can affect how others around you think.

4. Educate Others. Find opportunities to pass on facts and positive thinking.

5. Focus on the positive. Nobody is perfect; people suffering fråçom mental health/addiction make valuable contributions to society.

6. Support People. Treat everyone with dignity and respect, just as you expect to be treated.

7. Include Everyone. People with mental health and substance use have a right to an equal part in society. Let's make sure that

We now have both Methadone and Suboxone Program services at Evergreen Pharmacy (Kakabeka Falls and Rosslyn) for opioid addiction. Opioids are drugs that have pain relieving properties, but can induce euphoria (feeling high), which gives them the potential to be used improperly. Even when prescribed to treat a specific pain, anyone can develop a physical dependence on the prescription opioid drug. This dependence can be managed with a plan to slowly taper the dose/drug or rotate to alternative drugs. Even with prescribed opioids, this dependence can also develop into an addiction, or dangerous overdoses. Dependence and addiction are different things: Dependence occurs when your body has become reliant on the drug and you can have side effects if your body doesn't get the drug. Addiction occurs when a person is unable to meet work, family or social obligations, because of their lifestyle and behaviour surrounding obtaining and using the drug. Our pharmacists are always available to talk with anyone who has questions about managing opioids, developing a plan for their

ing plan to reduce doses or get off opioids, where appropriate.

Methadone and suboxone treatment is an important service to treat opioid addiction. When used at the correct dose, methadone prevents opioid withdrawals symptoms and reduces drug cravings without cause the person to feel high/sleepy. This lowers the harm of opiod misuse and gives people who are addicted to opioids a chance to stabilize their lives.

This is an important service locally, considering the high level of opioid usage, and unfortunately overdoses, in Northwestern Ontario. Given our pharmacy locations in the rural communities, improving access to this service for rural residents can greatly improve one's ability to maintain a normal lifestyle. Whether it be maintaining a job schedule or taking care of family at home, reducing the commute distance to Thunder Bay and having these services closer to home improves quality of life and compliance with the program.

Further to this topic, we recommend everyone have a naloxone kit in their home as part of a first aid kit, but especially if you or someone in your circle of family or friends uses opioids. A naloxone kit is free, and available as both an injectable and nasal spray. Naloxone can reverse an opioid overdose and save a life, especially considering the rural location of our community where it can take a little longer for a first responder to reach your home. For more information on naloxone kits and training, please speak with one of our pharmacists.

At Evergreen Pharmacy, we strive to make our pharmacy a safe place and resource for everyone, no matter where they come from or what illness/issue they may be dealing with. Our community is full of amazing people with a wide-ranging set of talents and gifts to make this community a great place to live, work or play. Let's work together to reduce stigma, because that is one barrier each of us can help control so that those needing help can feel safe asking for it.
