What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

Since the April edition, there has been two regular meetings of Council on April 5 and 19, 2023. There was also one Special Council meeting on April 26, 2023.

At the regular Council meeting on April 5th the following matters were considered:

- Council heard a deputation regarding medical serv-
- Council awarded the tender to replace the Farm Road Bridge and Pardee Road Bridge over Friendly
- Council approved recommendations from the Waste Management Committee to switch to a punch card system and to make improvements to the Good Neighbour Sheds.
- Council passed a by-law to appoint a new Chief Building Official.
- Council passed by-laws related to the recovery of fire department response activity costs.

At the regular Council meeting on April 19th, the following matters were considered:

- Council reviewed items related to the 2023 budget.
- Council directed Administration to seek funding for improvements to the Blake Hall.
- Council passed a by-law to make an appointment to the Lakehead Police Services Board.

At the Special Council meeting on April 26th, Hydro One provided a presentation on their vegetation management techniques and responded to questions from members of the public.

The next Council meetings will be held on May 3 and 17, 2023. Regular Council meetings are normally scheduled for the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month.

approved at the following meeting and are posted on the website once they have been approved and signed. If you don't have internet capabilities, you can always contact the office for copies of approved minutes.



Please take notice that the Council of The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing, sitting as Committee of the Whole, will hold a Public Meeting on Wednesday, May 17, 2023, at 5:30 p.m., at the Neebing Municipal Office to consider a proposed severance under Section 53 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, as amended. The Committee's recommendations to Council will be considered for ratification at the Regular Council Meeting on the same evening, commencing at 6:00 p.m.

The Application (B05-2023) is brought by Randy McAllister, the property owner. The land parcel which is the subject matter of the application subject matter of the application has municipal address 243 Klages Road, and is legally described as "Concession 4, Part Lot 3, Parts 1 and 4 on Reference Plan 55R11068, Parcel 26629 in the geographic Scoble Township, in the Municipality of Neebing and Province of Ontario". This is referred to as the "Subject Property".

The purpose of the proposed severance is to create one new lot. The severed parcel will be rectangular in shape, and have road frontage on Klages Road. A sketch showing the lot configuration is included with the application, a copy of which is available on the Neebing website (www.neebing.org/notices) or by contacting the Municipal Office.

ANY PERSON may attend the Public Meeting and/or make written or verbal presentations either in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed severance. If a person or public body that files an appeal of a decision of the Committee of the Whole in respect of the proposed severance does not make oral submissions at this public meeting, or does not provide written submissions prior to the decision of the Council in the matter, the Ontario Land Tribunal may not grant them status to maintain the appeal.

Please note that, in order to be considered, written comments must be submitted by 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 17, 2023. It is the writer's responsibility to check with the Clerk-Treasurer, using the contact information below, to confirm that electronically submitted or mailed written comments have been received.

Time to Think Outdoor Fire Safety Again

Although it looked like we might be impacted by a repeat of last year's Spring - with its cool temperatures, and enough fresh snow to keep the 'snowpack' in place until the end of April - along came the Sun, bringing with it a week of clear days and warm temperatures. This rapid elevation in temperatures has made for a terrific spell of Spring weather, and with the news reports that COVID restrictions are retreating into the background, many 'things' in our lives have begun to feel 'normal' again!

Another sure sign of Spring, was the return this year (on Easter Friday, at Blake Hall) of Neebing's annual Easter Egg Hunt. It was wonderful to see the number of families with young children who came out to join in the event. The many excited children sporting 'glitter tattoos', enjoying hot dogs and hoarding baskets of Easter Eggs garnered during the 'Hunt' were encouraging to see. Everyone appeared to be reveling in the opportunity to once again spend time in close contact with friends and neigh-

Although indoor fire safety ,especially regarding Smoke and CO alarms and cooking safety remain important year round, May is the month when outdoor fire safety requires extra focus and attention now and throughout the snow free months to follow. While we generally think of wild fires as being most hazardous during the hot and dry days of July or August, even warm, dry days in May (especially before the bush 'greens up') can quickly dry out last year's leaves and grasses providing abundant fine fuels for easy fire starts and rapid fire spread. To assist in protecting your property, it is wise to clean up dead grass and leaves in the proximity of your home, and to watch weather conditions closely. Be extra cautious during periods of warm dry weather which extend over several days in a row. More information, plus ideas and suggestions on actions you can take to improve the fire safety of your property during fire season, are available online at: FireSmart landscaping | ontario.ca .

During hot dry periods, the lower temperatures, lighter winds and higher humidity common to early morning and evening periods of the day make these a safer time for activities that involve heat, flame, or hot exhaust. During fire season, especially during hot dry periods, try to THINK FIRE as you make decisions about engaging in outdoor activities.

Camp/Recreational Fire Safety Tips

All it takes is one spark for things to go wrong. A carelessly abandoned campfire or a campfire built without safe clearance can turn a small fire into a dangerous and fast-moving blaze. Be sure to build your campfire in a way that does not endanger anyone or the surrounding forest. Enjoy a safe campfire by following these campfire safety tims:

- Follow local burning regulations. Keep up-to-date on fire bans in the area.
- Ensure you have a **current fire permit** and are **burning** only **during permitted hours**. In Neebing online permits may be obtained 24/7 during the fire season (April1 October 31) at: www.neebing.org.
- **Never build a campfire on a windy day.** Sparks or embers from the fire could travel quite a distance setting an unintentional fire.
- Watch the wind direction to ensure sparks aren't getting on flammable materials. Put the fire out if wind changes begin to cause concern
- Build campfires where they will not spread; well away from tents, trailers, dry grass, leaves, overhanging tree branches or any other combustible.
- Build campfires in fire pits if provided or on bare rock or sand, if no fire pit is provided.
- Maintain a 2 to 3.5 metre (6 10 foot) clearance around your campfire.
- Surround fire area with rocks or other noncombustible material to contain your campfire. Be aware that rocks obtained from water may explode due to moisture in the rock becoming superheated by the campfire.
- Use crumpled paper and/or kindling to start a fire rather than using flammable liquids.
- Never use gasoline as an aid to starting a campfire. If a fire starter is required, use only proper lighting fluid and use the lighting fluid sparingly. NEVER PUT IT ON AN OPEN FLAME since the fire can ignite the stream of lighting fluid and the flame will travel up the stream igniting the container in your hand and causing serious injury. Once the lighting fluid has been applied to the firewood, allow a few minutes for the explosive vapours to disperse before lighting. Remove the lighting fluid container a safe distance away before lighting the campfire.
- Secure all lighters and matches and keep them out of children's reach.
- Keep campfires to a small, manageable size no more than 1 metre (3 feet) high by 1 metre (3 feet) in diameter and don't let it get out of hand.
- **Don't burn garbage in your campfire.** The smell is unpleasant for you and your neighbours, and may attract animals to your campsite.
- **Keep all combustible materials,** including flammable liquids, propane cylinders, lighting fluid, etc. **away from the campfire**.
- Stack extra wood upwind and away from the campfire so that sparks from the campfire cannot ignite your woodpile. Have sufficient wood on hand to eliminate the need to leave your campsite to restock.
- Never leave campfires unattended. Ensure that a responsible adult is monitoring the campfire at all times. Supervise children around campfires at all times and never allow horseplay near or involving the campfire, such as jumping over a campfire. Do not allow children to run around near a campfire.
- Closely supervise children while roasting treats over a campfire. A flaming marshmallow can easily ignite a child's clothing. A heated metal skewer can be a burn hazard, as well as a puncture hazard.
- Loose clothing can easily catch fire. Never reach into a campfire to rearrange pieces of wood.
- Teach children how to STOP, DROP and ROLL should their clothing catch on fire.
- Teach children to **cool a burn with cool running water for 3 5 minutes**.
- **Keep plenty of water and a shovel around to douse the fire** when you're done. Use caution when applying water to the campfire. Once the water has been applied, stir the dampened coals and douse it again with water. As an added precaution, shovel sand or dirt to cover the dampened coals to smother any remaining embers.
- As little as 1 second contact with a 70°C (158°F) campfire can cause 3rd degree, full thickness
- The average campfire can get as hot as 500°C (932°F) in as little as 3 hrs.
- The majority of children are burned the morning after a fire from coming into contact with hot ashes or embers.
- A campfire left to burn itself out or put out with sand only, was still 100°C (212°F) eight hours later. The buried coals and embers retain their heat underground like an oven. There is also a risk that the fire may spontaneously re-ignite. A child may mistake the pile of sand or dirt as a sand castle and attempt to play in it. The temperature, less than 10 cm (4") below the surface of the sand or dirt can be as high as 300 °C (572°F).
- A campfire put out with water is reduced to 50°C (122°F) within 10 minutes of applying the water and reduced to 10°C (50°F) after 8 hrs. The safest way to extinguish a campfire is with water.

Apply now Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program

Who is eligible?

You may be eligible if you:

- Are 65 or older
- · Are a resident of Ontario
- Have an annual net income of \$22,200 or less for a single person or a combined annual net income of \$37,100 or less for a couple
- Have no access to any other form of dental benefits (e.g. private insurance or other government program)

Where can I get dental care?

Dental care services are provided through Public Health Units and participating Community Health Centres (CHC), Aboriginal Health Access Centres (AHAC), as well as mobile dental clinics in some areas.

What services are covered?

- · Examinations and assessments
- Preventive services.
- Restorative services to repair broken teeth and cavities
- . .
- Oral surgery to remove teeth or abnormal
- Anaesthesia
- Endodontic services to treat infection and pain
- Periodontal services to treat gum conditions and diseases.

What about dentures?

Prosthodontic services, including dentures, will be partially covered. Please speak to your local public health unit for more information.

How do I apply?

There are several options available for applying for the Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program:

- Apply online at ontario.ca/SeniorsDental
- Print, fill out, and mail your application
- Visit your local Public Health Unit or participating CHC or AHAC to pick up an application form and/or get support with completing your application

And if I need help?

What happens if I am approved

Once your application has been approved, you will be mailed a welcome package and a dental card. To receive services, present this card to the Public Health Unit, Community Health Centre, or Aboriginal Health Access Centre providing the service.

You will be notified each year of your eligibility for continued participation in the program, or about how to re-apply to the program if that is required.





The Rural Pharmacist: Where Have You Been Getting Your "Specialty" Medication?

Welcome back to this edition of The Rural Pharmacist! This month I wanted to touch on a topic that was previously covered by Henry last year. Or maybe it was the year prior. I'll be completely honest, the past 2-3 years in healthcare have been a bit

The return of in-person events, such sports and entertainment (*cough* go Leafs go) at full capacity have been relatively recent. I mention this because in April we attended a nationwide pharmacy conference in Toronto that addressed our profession's continued utilization and growth within the everchanging healthcare landscape. Nothing could be more exciting for our profession; our skillsets are being recognized and worked into rotation.

It was a great opportunity to hear from leaders in our industry as well as from independent pharmacists and owners, both big and small. How are you helping your patients? What is working at your store? What obstacles have you encountered and how have you overcome them? Every coffee break began feeling like a miniature interview.

One common concern that kept getting brought up in discussion was the increase of "specialty pharmacies". Fancy name. These pharmacies work something like this: a pharmacy or drug company will approach a prescriber and convince them that they are the only experts on medication X. Considering this and, in an honest attempt to help their patient, a prescriber will send a prescription to a designated pharmacy that is often located in another city. This regularly happens without consult with a patient's pharmacist.

As a result, these "specialty pharmacies" circumvent the pharmacistpatient relationship that already exists between the patient and their regular, local pharmacy team.

There are several issues that can arise from this model of patient care. To start with the obvious, specialty pharmacies rarely see the whole picture. This ranges from the relationships you have in your community

all the way to the medications you take and how they interact with each other. And it goes both ways.

We found that a lot of pharmacists only learn about the "specialty" medication during a medication review or at a hospital discharge. Nobody is really benefitting when a medication profile is spread across multiple stores. It can be unorganized, inefficient, and downright unsafe. For example, when pharmacies are asked to send medication lists to hospitals or long-term care homes on behalf of their patients, it is paramount that these lists are up to date. When medications are dispensed across multiple stores things can get missed. It happens.

The reality is your regular pharmacy team is properly trained and better positioned to collaborate with the rest of your healthcare team.

Another issue with specialty pharmacies is the delivery of medications. From my own experience, some of these pharmacies will send packages directly to a patient's house only to drop off the package in an unsecure location and regardless of the weather. We do live in Northwestern Ontario. Just this past winter one of our patients returned home from a day at work only to see that their medication had been left outside in minus 30 weather. Doesn't that make you feel ... special?

One of our other patients used to drive to the Thunder Bay airport to pick up medications. They were deemed to live too far for medication delivery. Therefore, they had to drive into the city themselves and in doing so, pass their regular pharmacy along the way. So long convenience factor.

Another tactic specialty pharmacies will employ is the promise for regular follow-up regarding their medications. From my experience, this rarely happens. Maybe it starts off as a regular incentive, but it soon falls off.

To be fair, there are some medications that cannot be filled at your regular pharmacy. This can happen for a variety of reasons. For example, compassionate care medications that

> must be acquired through specific programs. However, the purpose of this article is to educate our patients and to inform them that they often have a choice.

> It was enlightening to learn that several other local pharmacies were struggling with this issue across the province. The solution is simple: if you have any questions as to whether you can have a medication filled with our pharmacies, please ask. We strongly believe that the consolidation of medications at one pharmacy is the safest and most effective way to manage a medication profile.













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
