NOISE: LH North has issued a noise advisory.


Beginning July 5, 2023, rock blasting near Little Trout Bay Road at Highway 61 will be happening with multiple blasts scheduled over several weeks taking place.

Upcoming Roads Projects

There are three types of roads projects: large projects, maintenance projects and emergency repairs. Planning for large projects usually begins years ahead of time and involves a determination for how to pay for the work. Large projects are listed in the capital plan, which is reviewed each year by Council. The project list from the latest version of the plan is shown below. The capital plan, which is updated every year, is used when creating the annual Municipal Budget and the project list can change. Maintenance projects are funded by Municipal taxpayers, and these projects include maintaining and repairing road surfaces and shoulders (patching, gravel, ditching, culvert replacement, dust control etc.). Emergency repairs are completed as needed after an event occurs, such as repairs required after a flood.

In 2023 the large projects are to replace two bridges, one on Farm Road and one on Pardee Road. Maintenance projects in 2023 include work on roads in Pearson and Pardee with several culvert replacements planned. Regular maintenance of the road surface is ongoing and if you notice a problem with the roads surface, please give the office a call and we can let the Roads Crew know about the issue.

In addition to listing roadwork projects, the capital plan shows scheduled fleet replacements, land and facility upgrades and more. This planning document helps the Municipality identify and alleviate future financial pinch points and helps ensure the best use of tax dollars.



Coming in July!!! On-Site Food Waste Diversion Pilot Project

The Municipality of Neebing is once again partnering with Ottawa based company, Food Cycle Science to pilot an on-site food waste diversion solution that will reduce the amount of food waste headed to the landfills.

Neebing will provide FoodCycler machines at a subsidized price for residents to test in their homes over a 12-week period. Each resident will track the amount of food waste they have diverted throughout the pilot duration to estimate the total impact of the pilot program. The FoodCycler now comes in two sizes, 2.5 litres and 5 liters. **Registration to participate in the program will begin mid-July.** Residents will be able to choose which size they want at the time of registration. **Watch our website and Facebook page for details.** For information on the FoodCycler and the pilot program, visit www.neebing.org/foodcycler.

Why you should participate in the program?



Coming January 2024 New Landfill Punch Cards

Neebing Council has passed a new by-law that will come into effect on January 1, 2024. The effect of the by-law is that punch cards will replace the current bag tag system. Permanent residents will still be allowed 100 bags and seasonal residents will be allowed 50 bags. However, free tags will no longer be provided in exchange for bags of recycling. Watch for details on distribution of the punch cards in the Neebing News, Facebook and the website over the coming months.



At the regular Council meeting on June 21st, the following matters were considered:

- Council reviewed options for branded merchandise.
- Council approved a sponsorship for the Rural Heritage Agricultural Society.

THE PROBLEM

My problem is an adult one since this age group calls the plays. The serious lack of sensitivity by parents and educators to the tremendous potential of museums for a teaching tool, has given this writer cause for great concern!

"During the last decade the museum has rallied all its powers to overcome the lethargy of the public towards first hand knowledge of art and science.

Without adult interest and participation, collections do not take place and just as the setting sun darkens our environment so do our pictures of the past dim as items become more scarce and more expensive.

Due to the absence of a museum depot, older people wishing to make bequests have no place to dispose of their historical items, and these valuable artefacts are often lost forever. Children pass through school with little insight of their past heritage. "our great metropolitan museums have educational offerings to make that can only be conveyed to their proper recipients, the general public through the ingenuity and energy of every group enlisted with the task of adult education.

I shall attempt in the following pages to reverse this situation by showing the many and varied educational services which can be provided by an effective museum establishment with an attendant intellectual growth within the viewer, of appreciation, awareness, and understanding for our founding fathers. The word "antiques" will be used periodically in order to maintain your interest in search for pieces of eight which I prefer to call knowledge. I intend to lead you along the path to learning as any good museum should do!



VVV gion. As a tribute to our past Strawberry Socials, last year I gave you the recipe for the Hot Milk Cake that the women used to bake for the strawberries and ice cream. However, I regret that I forgot to add the sugar much to the dismay of the readers. With my apologies I am resubmitting the recipe with the sugar added. Please try it out and enjoy with your strawberries or any in season berries with ice cream. It's always a family pleaser.

HOT MILK CAKE

Recipe used for Strawberry Social cakes, back in the day when we could bake them at home! Submitted by Doreen Rogers.

4 eggs 2 tsp. baking powder 2 cups flour 2 tbsp. butter 2 cups sugar 1 cup milk

1/4 tsp. salt 1 tsp. vanilla

Beat eggs until light and fluffy. Add sugar, beat well. Add flour, salt and baking powder, mixing well. Heat milk, butter and vanilla. Slowly add to first mixture, beating well.

Pour into greased 9X13 pan. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes

If desired, you can make a yummy icing, too!

1 cup brown sugar 1 cup chopped nuts 1/2 cup butter

1 cup coconut 2 tbsp. milk

Heat in microwave until butter is melted and mixture can easily be combined. Spread over top of cake after it is baked. Return to oven for about 5 minutes to set icing and brown slightly.

By now most of you have tried some of this year's rhubarb as a sauce or in some baking. Here is an alternative to experiment with and it is very good for you because rhubarb is full of antioxidants, a good amount of vitamin k, fibre calcium and vitamin c. This refreshing drink can also be made ahead and frozen. Enjoy on a hot summer's day!

RHUBARB REFRESHER

Cook until soft 2 lbs. of chopped rhubarb in 5 cups of boiling water. Sieve. For each cup of juice add 1/3 cup sugar or less to taste. You may also use honey as your sweetener. Stir until dissolved. Now, you can serve this juice as is with ice and as an option you can add 1/4 cup of lemon juice or orange juice. Ginger ale is often added just before serving.

The following recipe is one-of her many legacy recipes from her collection as shared with the Rosslyn Women's Institute and submitted by Joan Bailey.

This is a delicious sweet and sour pork recipe to be served over a hot bed of your favourite rice such as Jasmine, Basmati or brown or white rice. Please enjoy the sweet and sour tastes along with the colourful array of red, yellow and orange peppers on a lovely summer's night.

SWEET AND SOUR PORK

2 tbsp. oil 1 15 ounce can of pineapple chunks 2 tbsp. ketchup 1 crushed clove of garlic 1 lb. boneless pork cubed

1/2 cup corn syrup 2 tbsp. soya sauce

1/4 cup vinegar

green, red, yellow, orange peppers cut into pieces

Brown pork in oil.

Add the pineapple, corn syrup, ketchup, soya sauce, garlic, and vinegar. Bring to a boil. Simmer for 10 minutes. Mix the cornstarch with 2 tbsp. of water. Add to the pork with the peppers. Boil for two minutes stirring constantly.

The Rural Pharmacist: Reminder to Apply for the ODB Senior Co-Payment Program

It's almost that time of the year: the Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) program deductible season. Maybe this is your first year being eligible for coverage through the provincial drug insurance program. Special shout out to my Aunt Kathy who turned 65 last month by the way. Or maybe you've been a recipient of the program for past 10 years, and you didn't even know it! In any case, it's always worth a mention as August 1st seems to sneak up on all of us. We'll start off with a refresher of what the deductible represents. Furthermore, I'll discuss the parameters that allow certain patients to receive additional drug coverage under the ODB Senior Co-Payment Program. For our readers it may be worth following along as eligible households could stand to save a few dollars on drug costs.

The ODB program allows individuals 65 years of age and older to receive coverage for an array of medications in Ontario. However, to gain access to the program individuals must pay an annual deductible of \$100. Most people are familiar with the concept of a deductible. Imagine driving down Highway 61 and a transport throws a stone into your window. Crack! Hopefully that didn't hit too close to home with anyone. For your windshield to be fixed you may have to pay a deductible before your insurance kicks in. That's essentially it. The same concept applies to the deductible paid through the ODB program. The good news is that once your deductible has been satisfied the regular co-pay, the amount paid per prescription, goes back to normal.

Now here is where certain households may find some cost savings: eligible seniors get additional coverage through what is known as the Seniors Co-Payment Program (SCP). This program is intended to help reduce the cost of medications for individuals who have an annual income below a certain threshold. In this program, recipients do not have to pay an annual \$100. They also have smaller co-payments with each prescription. In August 2021, the income eligibility for the SCP was updated from \$19,300 to \$22,200 (for single seniors) and from \$32,300 to \$37,100 (for senior couples). This may sound familiar as I wrote about this topic in a newsletter from 2021 as we approached a new ODB deductible season. However, don't hold your breath. We don't expect those numbers to change in 2023.

The application process for the SCP is straight forward. An application form can be found on the Ontario Ministry of Health's website. Can't find it? We can help you out! Just ask for a copy at the pharmacy in Rosslyn or Kakabeka. Once you've completed the application the government will ask for certain doc-

A fair estimate of \$200 per year could be saved for someone using 5 chronic medications, for example. Over the past few years, we've helped several patients get onboarded with this program. Extreme Heat

Extreme heat can be dangerous for everyone, but people who work outdoors, the elderly, some people with disabilities, and children, particularly infants, are more vulnerable.

Hazard Information

Extreme heat can make you sick with heat stroke, heat rash and/or heat cramps.

Safety Tips

If you feel dizzy, weak or overheated:

- go to a cool place;
- sit or lie down;
- drink water;
- wash your face with cool water

If you don't feel better soon, seek medical help immediately.

If you are indoors:

- stay indoors to limit sun exposure
- take frequent cool showers or baths
- stay on lower floors if there's no air conditioning
- drink water and eat light, regular meals avoid using salt


If you are outdoors:

- spend the hottest part of the day in air-conditioned buildings
- drink water every 15 to 20 minutes even if you aren't thirsty
- dress in light-coloured, loose-fitting clothing covering as much of your skin as possible
- wear a wide-brimmed hat to protect your face
- wear full UVA and UVB protection sunglasses
- apply sunscreen with SPF 15 or higher 20 minutes before going outside
- apply lip balm with an SPF 15 or higher

Prepare Now

Take the following steps so you and your family are prepared in the event of an emergency:

- cover windows that receive morning or afternoon sun with drapes, shades or awnings
- include extra water, sunscreen and sunglasses (with full UVA and UVB protection) in your emergency survival kit

WELCOME - Summer 2023

NOTE: 'This piece was written during the third week of June when the weather forecast offered continued heat and little prospect of rain with the prospect of Extreme fire danger levels continuing into July. While the 3 days of soaking rain the last

weekend in June was a pleasant surprise and brought relief from the High and Extreme fire danger ratings, it is still early in the fire season and the return of hot dry weather could see a quick return to higher fire danger levels. The information in this piece regarding the recognition of high fire danger conditions, safe actions to take, and suggested actions that can be taken over time to reduce your property's vulnerability to wildfire remain of value regardless of the recent change in fire danger levels. Enjoy and Stay Safe)

The apparent reluctance of our recent winter to concede its cold weather temperatures and heavy snowfalls and allow for a timely spring arrival, might have caused concern for some that a cool, wet introduction to our summer weather might be likely to follow. However, that's not how things have played out for Neebing residents. High daily temperatures, and only spotty rainfall in our area lead to **High and Extreme Fire Danger** ratings developing in the area from mid May onward. In turn the dry hot weather eventually led to the introduction of **fire bans** by many local fire departments **in late May**, quickly followed by MNR declaring a **Restricted Fire Zone** (**RFZ**) covering much of Northern Ontario in **early June**.

As I write in the third week of June fire danger levels remain in the *High and Extreme* range for much of Northern Ontario and the fire bans and the RFZ designation remain in place, and can be expected to stay in place until there is sufficient rainfall to improve the core fire conditions in the area. While the East Coast recently received a significant rainfall, allowing opportunities for fire crews to gain control over large, destructive wildfires in that region, and the West is just now reporting some welcome rainfall relief (even snow in

some areas) that is helping to lower the fire danger levels and improve the success of firefighters efforts to corral the many fires in the region, current forecasts for our area are showing the possibility of some rainfall over the next week or so, but there is no indication yet that the predicted moisture (if it does indeed fall) will provide the sufficient dampening effect required to remedy the dry conditions in our area.

In periods when fire conditions are in the High and Extreme Danger levels and the potential of new fire starts is high, the use of Fire Bans and RFZ designations help reduce the potential for human caused fire starts by limiting human activities from open fires, to recreating and even working in forested


While fire starts from natural causes such as lightening strikes are difficult to avoid, as we have witnessed in Neebing during past dry periods accidental human fire starts from things as common as; sparks from a lawnmower blade striking hidden metal or hot exhaust pipes on an ATV contacting dry grasses have occurred. Under normal conditions these situations may be dealt with personally, with the heel of a boot, a pail of water, fire extinguisher or even a hand full of sand. In High and Extreme Fire Danger conditions however these simple events can rapidly escalate into fires requiring a full fire response with pumpers and tankers and wild fire units to gain control before they grow beyond the scope of local resources.

Thank You to all our Neebing residents who, for the past month, have taken great care to keep the community safe from wildfire situations during this time of high fire-risk. Like many others, I too have last falls' brush pile still waiting to be burned. I am also holding back on several outside projects in the bush until fire conditions improve. And when I get impatient with the wait for 'better conditions', I have only to look at the brown grass where I have only cut the lawn once, and note the frequency for which my garden requires watering, to be reminded that **patience and vigilance** are the name of the game for now and until conditions change, and conditions will eventually change, and we will have a chance to get to work on those summer projects we had planned to tackle earlier - but not until fire danger levels diminish!

Some quick wildfire tips as we head into the heart of

- **Fire Danger Level Maps:** Monitor the daily fire danger level ratings on the MNR website at: Forest Fire Info Map (gov.on.ca). These maps provide a quick overview of fire danger levels in the area. Short duration rains can indicate some relief but may quickly return to higher danger levels if high temps and low humidity prevail.
- Municipal Website: www.neebing.org for updates on fire conditions in the community, and any new or altered fire restrictions.
- Smoke Mapping: For information concerning visible wildfire smoke in the air check: Smoke Forecast FireSmoke.ca , to determine the origin and intensity of the smoke, and obtain a forecast of its movement.
- **FireSmart:** To identify what actions you may take on your property to improve your resistance to wildfire threats check: Be FireSmart | ontario.ca. Also see the accompanying Home Ignition Zone graphic for guidance on maintaining a relatively fire safe area for 100' around your home. FS_Home-Ignition-Zone-Poster.pdf (firesmartcanada.ca)
- The Three 30s of Wildfire Danger: (Heard on a Halifax news broadcas) High Temperatures, Low Humidity, and High Wind speeds are all factors favourable to wildfire start and spread. Monitor conditions in your area.... If any of these factors have numbers in the 30's range, consider fire conditions to be dangerous.
- Observe conditions close to your home such as the presence or absence of dew on the grass in the morning, and the quick browning of recently mowed grass. Both are indicative of a moisture shortage and conditions conducive to easy fire start and spread.

Hopefully wildfire conditions will improve soon, and we will all be able to enjoy a full range of summer activities. Be sure to check for safety tips regarding your favourite summer activities on the OAFC webpage: Spring & Summer Fire Safety Tips | Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs (oafc.on.ca)

Work with your neighbours in any overlapping priority zones!

Non-combustible Zone (0-1.5 metres)

Reduce the chance of wind-blown embers igniting materials near your home. A non-combustible surface should extend around the entire home and any attachments, such as decks. Creating a non-combustible surface can be as easy clearing vegetation and combustible material down to mineral soil. To add to your landscape design, use non-combustible materials such as gravel, brick, or concrete in this critical area adjacent to your home. Woody shrubs, trees or tree branches should be avoided in this zone, any that are present should be properly mitigated.

Zone 1 (1.5-10 metres)


Create a landscape that will not easily transmit fire to the home. A FireSmart yard includes making smart choices for your plants, shrubs, grass and mulch. Selecting fire-resistant plants and materials can increase the likelihood of your home surviving a wildfire. Plant a low density of fire-resistant plants and shrubs. Avoid having any woody debris, including mulch, as it provides potential places for fires to start. Storing items such as firewood piles, construction materials, patio furniture, tools and decorative pieces against or near a house is a major fire hazard. Move firewood piles, trailers/ recreational vehicles, storage sheds and other combustible structures out of this zone and into Zone 2. If unable to move, store firewood inside your mitigated garage, shed or other ember resistant structures, create a non-combustible zone underneath and for 1.5 metres around trailers/ vehicles and mitigate sheds and other structures to the same standards as those of your home.

Zone 2 (10-30 metres)

If your property extends out to this zone, thin and prune evergreen trees to reduce hazard in this area. Within 30 metres of your home, selectively remove evergreen trees to create at least 3 metres of horizontal space between the single or grouped tree crowns and remove all branches to a height of 2 metres from the ground on the remaining evergreen trees. If possible, pruning trees up to 200 metres from your home (Zone 3) is recommended. Regularly clean up accumulations of fallen branches, dry grass and needles from on the ground to eliminate potential surface fuels. Consider seeking the guidance of a forest professional with wildland fire knowledge on appropriate management options for this zone.

Zone 3 (30-100 metres)

Taking FireSmart actions in Zone 3 on your property will influence how a wildfire approaches your home. You can change the dynamics of wildfire behaviour by managing vegetation within this zone. Look for opportunities to create a fire break by creating space between trees and other potentially flammable vegetation. Thinning and pruning is effective here as well. These actions will help reduce the intensity of a wildfire. Consider seeking the guidance of a forest professional with wildland fire knowledge on appropriate management options for this zone.
