New Landfill Punch Cards 2024

The new punch card system for the landfill site will come into effect in January 2024. Watch for your punch cards to arrive in the mail early in the new year. The transition period will run until March 1, 2024, during which time residents can use their bag tags if they have not received their punch cards. Please contact the municipal office if you have not received your punch cards by the end of February. Permanent residents will still be allowed 100 bags and seasonal residents will be allowed 50 bags. Free bag tags with recycling will no longer be issued after

January 1, 2024.

What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

Since the November edition, there have been two regular meeting of Council on November 1 and 15, 2023.

At the regular Council meeting on November 1st, the following matters were considered:

- Council approved a severance application for a property on Oliver Creek Road.
- Council approved a policy for the use of the corporate logo.
- Council scheduled a meeting to review the 2024 budget for January 24, 2024.
- Council passed a by-law to appoint Roger Van Ballegooie as Acting Fire Chief and to appoint other officers.
- Council passed an updated bylaw that establishes the civic addressing system.

At the regular Council meeting November 15th, the following matters were considered:

- Council approved a recommendation from the Waste Management Committee to participate in an applied research project with Fleming College related to waste management in Neebing.
- Council passed a fit for duty policy.
- Council approved reserve fund transfers related to 2023 construction projects.
- Council passed an updated by-

law to prohibit smoking on municipal property which now includes vaping.

 Council passed a by-law to renew the agreement with Ministry of Health for emergency dispatch services.

The next Council meetings will be held on December 6 and 20, 2023. Regular Council meetings are normally scheduled for the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month.

This article contains only highlights from Council meetings – visit the website to see the approved minutes from each of the meetings. The minutes of each meeting are approved at the following meeting and are posted on the website once they have been approved and signed. If you don't have internet capabilities, you can always contact the office for copies of approved minutes.

Meeting agendas are always posted online on the Friday prior to the Wednesday meeting. Come out and see what your Council is doing on your behalf. Feel free to contact the Municipal Office for further information or with input into any of the items that Council is considering. The meetings are now being held at the Municipal Office, but there is the option to attend virtually as well. The links to login to the meetings are posted on our website in the calendar details.

Ice Rinks in Neebing

Neebing has two Outdoor Ice Rinks that are free to use and open from late December to early March.

Ice can be difficult to establish on top of the existing sod surface, and weather plays an important roll in determining when the rinks open and how long the skating season lasts.

The rinks are created and maintained by a few dedicated volunteers. If you would like to volunteer to help with the rinks this year, please contact the Neebing Office or speak to Councillor Coulson or Councillor Gardner.

In 2023 Neebing was the recipient of a grant from the Northen Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation (NOHFC) for significant improvements to both of our rinks. Alf Olsen Memorial Park Rink, located on Highway 597, will receive a new hard surface and lighting. Blake Hall Rink, located behind the Blake Community Hall on Blake Hall Road, will receive a new hard surface and an open-air roof. Both these improvements will extend the skating season and provide a hard surface for other sports when it is

too warm to skate. The NOHFC grant was awarded at the beginning of the summer and work began to develop the purchasing documentation. A tender was issued in late August, and one bid was received for the work, but it was over budget and Council sadly rejected the bid. It was too late in the construction season to re-work the tender documents and get bids before winter closed in so we are going to have one more year with our current rinks. The tender is being reworked and reissued for a 2024 construction date.

Prior to all this good news, Neebing received a donation from SWOOP Airlines for Alf Olsen Rink to build rink boards (SWOOP gave this donation to Neebing in recognition of some light-hearted advertising confusing Pearson Township with Pearson Airport in Toronto). The rink boards have been constructed but will remain in storage for this season as we don't want to put them up and then risk damaging them when they have be removed and reinstalled when the new rink surface is constructed. They will be installed on top of the new rink surface.

Highway 61 Improvements

Construction along Highway 61 between Jarvis Bay Road and Highway 130 is continuing over the winter months. The work includes addressing drainage deficiency, culvert replacement or rehabilitation, guiderail replacement/adjustments, platform widening, shoulder correction, utility relocations, entrance rehabilitation and paving.

Delays and lane closures will be ongoing until the project is complete in 2024. Please be patient and help keep all the workers safe. You can collect your tags at the municipal landfill sites during regular hours of operation. You MUST present photo ID to the attendant in order to receive your tags.

Recycling Yes we have a recycling program! We accept #I through #7 plastics as well as carboard. View our recycling sorting guide to determine if your items are acceptable recycling materials. Please remember to BAG your cans and plastics and FLATTEN your cardboard. We do not accept plastic grocery bags.

do what you want. Christmas can


still be special and the memories di-

My Christmas memories are a mixed bag of big and small, good and bad. I remember these HUGE dinners in my grandparents 'rumpus room' with so many relatives they had to set up saw-horses and sheets of plywood to have enough tables to fit everyone. I remember Christmas Eve sitting on the floor in front of my mother as she put 'pin-curls' in my hair before bed so I'd have the perfect curls for Christmas morning. I remember my Grandfather's collection of nut-crackers which I could never master, and the bowls of tiny sweet 'Christmas' oranges. I remember the year we had no money but still, hanging on the back of my door on Christmas morning was the yellow dress my mom knew I had been longing for. Later as a parent I spoiled my kids, loading them up with more presents than they needed. I was always so exhausted on Christmas morning because I had been up all night wrapping and making things 'just right' for everyone and could barely keep my eyes open to enjoy it.

Today our kids are grown and the interest in getting presents has faded. The decorations are sparse. There is less fanfare. There are fewer people and it's often just us and our kids or a few close friends. We have a few simple traditions that have evolved over time. Sipping tea or cider while playing Scrabble or Boggle. Watching a Christmas movie. Driving around town listening to Christmas music and looking at lights. But everything is laid back and flexible. Everyone goes with the flow and honestly if I announced that this Christmas would be spent at a hotel eating take-out and laying by the pool everyone would be on board. Because we know the important things aren't things. And they definitely aren't about stress or extra work or debt or exhaustion or meeting unrealistic expectations that I maybe saw in a magazine or on a reality show. It's about being together.

Don't get me wrong, those childhood memories are grand. And the years of Christmases when my own kids were young are cherished memories. When almost everything was homegrown and homemade. When the tree was real. When the decorations were crafted from tiny hands. It was definitely a magical time. But there were also some very dark Christmases in my past. The Christmas my mom died. The year a loved one left. When money was scarce. When I was unwell. One year I lived alone and skipped Christmas all together. And the lessons of the dark Christmases have stuck with me. A reminder that Christmas isn't always a happy shiny time for everyone. There are individuals and families struggling with so many things right now - finances, health, grief - and when this big commercially driven holiday comes along it's hard to handle sometimes. So I am trying to scale back myself, and hope that others will see that it's okay too and that there might be less pressure all around to achieve perfection. Because it's never going to be perfect. Life isn't a Hallmark movie. It's usually much harder and much messier and sometimes downright painful. I'm determined to be extra kind, extra patient, extra compassionate this Christmas no matter where I am or who I'm interacting with. Because you don't know what

'Controlled Burn' Fire Training Exercises

As Neebing Emergency Services (NES) is without ready access to such elaborate fire training props such as 'fire training towers', our team has many times benefited from the generosity of Neebing residents who have decided to donate personal structures to be used as training sites for our volunteer fire fighters. These structures, which are safely ignited to create 'real' fire situations, allow our fire team members to become familiar with the actions necessary to rescue potential 'victims', as well as use proper fire suppression techniques to manage live fire while under real heat and smoke conditions.

Depending on the condition of the potential structure, it is often possible to conduct training sessions over a period of several weeks by focusing first on cold-condition training (using generated 'smoke' for search and rescue), then moving on to dealing with a simulated fire attack or 2nd story victim rescue (using accessible windows and/or a variety of ladder arrangements).

The final training exercise usually involves the setting and extinguishing of a variety of fires strategically situated within the structure, which allow the FF's present to practice suppression techniques meant to safely put out the fire and thereby 'save the structure'! Ultimately a final fire is set so that the building can be burned completely, with FF's engaged in controlling the fire and protecting nearby exposures until the donated building is safely on the ground or in the basement.

These controlled-burn training evolutions are invaluable in helping NES Fire-Fighters to recognize 'safe' (as well as dangerous) fire conditions, and to identify and practice appropriate suppression techniques while responding to those various fire conditions as presented by the building structure. To date, NES has been fortunate to be able to conduct, on average, one (1) live burn training exercise each year, thereby exposing its FFs to real structure fire conditions within the community.

If you have a structure on your property that you would like to offer for possible use by NES for a controlled burn training exercise, kindly send an email to neebing@neebing.org, indicate that you are interested in making a structure you own available for controlled burn training and provide contact information to reach you for follow up. NES will carry out a pre-plan property review to determine whether (or not) your structure/site is suitable for the purpose of an NES controlled burn training exercise and advise accordingly.

conditions involve dry grasses, fine fuels or an up-slope. Although at this time of year most fire spreads are quickly and successfully brought under control by NES fire services, the potential for unanticipated fire travel from a debris pile to nearby outbuildings (and even a personal residence) can, and have, happened. Hopefully by the time you read this piece, Mother Nature will have blessed us with some fresh snow cover, and outdoor fire concerns will be behind us. While knowing that earlier Neebing News (NN) articles have covered such topics, here are a couple of fire safety tips that are worth repeating to ensure you have taken appropriate actions:

debris piles, especially if their site

• Heating System Servicing: Regardless of the fuel source used in your home, you need to ensure that your heating system is ready to go for winter, with filters changed,

"Considerations for Safe Open Fire Burning in Late Fall".

In late Fall, conditions are generally considered to be safe enough to allow for outdoor burning, even during the daytime. Many residents take advantage of that expected sense of 'safe-time' to clean up their properties, and then to get rid of the natural debris through the ignition of a live fire. Residents are reminded to be extra alert in setting any fires when/if ground conditions are still **dry**, especially if fine fuels such as tall dead grasses are present. As well, residents should be particularly aware of building fires on south-facing slopes on sunny days. South-facing slopes are 'heat sinks' that can be much warmer and drier than other close by flat areas. If the decision is made to burn in such areas, extra caution and diligence is essential. Fires in these areas can start relatively easily - spreading quickly up the slope, or through available dried grass and rapidly become difficult to contain or get out of control.
