When to Contact the OPP

When to Call 911

If someone's health, immediate safety or property is threatened, call 911. When calling 911, be specific about what services(s) you need, ie: Police, Fire and/or Ambulance and provide as much detail as possible.

When to Call the Non-Emergency Line

For non-emergency events or minor crimes you can either:

- Call the 24-hour toll-free number at 1-888-310-1122;
- Call the detachment at 807-683-4200; or
- File a report online at https://www.opp.ca/index.php?id=132

The following can be reported online:

- Theft Under \$5,000
- Mischief / Damage to Property Under \$5,000
- Mischief / Damage to Vehicle Under \$5,000
- Theft from Vehicle Under \$5,000
- Lost / Missing Property Under \$5,000 including a license plate(s) or validation sticker(s)
- Theft of any type of gasoline from a gas station
- **Driving Complaints**

The following should be reported in-person by calling the toll-free or detachment numbers:

- the occurrence happened outside of OPP jurisdiction
- there are any identifiable suspects
- someone was injured
- the occurrence involves a weapon
- the occurrence involves any damage to a motor vehicle due to an actual or apparent collision, including fail to remain collisions
- the occurrence involves a break and enter (e.g. unlawful entry and theft from a house, a building or a structure)
- the occurrence involves drugs or gambling (including lottery tickets)
- the occurrence involves a passport

The OPP use the data from calls to track patterns and create operational plans for patrolling and staffing. Residents are encouraged to report nonemergency events to help the detachment plan for where the resources are most needed.

How is the municipality billed for OPP Services?

The municipality is not billed on a per call basis. The majority of the cost for OPP services is based on the number of occupied properties within the municipality. There is an annual flat rate charge for each household and business. The rest of the cost is based on a percentage of municipal calls for service across the entire province and accounts for a small portion of the annual bill. If you would like more details about the cost for policing, please contact the municipal office.

What's Been Happening at Council Meetings

Since the March edition, there have been two regular meetings of Council on March 5 and 19, 2025 and one special meeting of Council on March 5,

At the special Council meeting on March 5, 2025, Council reviewed the second draft of the 2025 budget.

At the regular Council meeting on March 5th, the following matters were considered:

- Council authorized the purchase of wildland fire rated personal protective equipment.
- Council reviewed a request to purchase punch cards at the landfill sites. This service will be provided in the future when payment services can be provided at the landfill sites.
- Council supported resolutions from municipalities promoting buy local, buy Canadian campaigns.
- Council approved a sponsorship for the Thunder Bay Regional Health Sciences Foundation Motorcycle Ride for Dad.
- Council passed a by-law to update the rental fees for the Blake Hall prop-

At the regular Council meeting on March 19th, the following matters were considered:

- Council passed a by-law to update building permit fees.
- Council passed a resolution to direct staff to support the local economy and to buy Canadian wherever possible.
- Council reviewed the first draft of a Facility Rental Usage Policy for the Blake Hall property.
- Council supported a resolution related to landlord tenant reforms.

The next Council meetings will be held on April 2 and 16, 2025. Regular Council meetings are normally scheduled for the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month; however, there is only one meeting in January, July and Au-



Trash is Cash

Did you know that by diverting materials from the landfill sites, you can not only help protect the environment but put some cash in your pocket or save money?

Here are some examples:

- <u>Upcycling</u> Repurpose unwanted items into products of higher value or quality, such as turning old furniture into unique pieces that can be sold or save you money on buying new furniture.
- <u>Scrap Metal</u> Collect and sell scrap metal to one of the local metal recycling companies.
- Bottle/Can Return Beer cans and liquor bottles can be returned to the Beer Store for cash. Pop cans can also be placed into the Neebing Fire Rescue Association bins at the landfill site to help them fundraise for equipment to support our emergency services.
- Participating in recycling and diversion programs, helps residents stay within their allotted bag limit and reduces the need to purchase additional punch cards.



Why Do Municipalities Put Limits on Waste Disposal at Landfill Sites?

The answer is – we can't afford a new one! Landfills are a large burden on our municipal budget and therefore you the taxpayer! In an effort to minimize this burden, Neebing charges tipping fees and put bag limits in place to encourage minimizing the waste to extend the life of our landfills. There are different ways that you can manage waste, such as recycling, reusing, repurposing, rehoming, composting, or choosing products with less packag-

The Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) regulates and monitors landfill site approvals and operation. In 2018, an MECP inspection determined that Scoble Landfill was at capacity and Sand Hill Landfill was nearing capacity but was also outside the approved boundaries. Neebing was ordered to take certain actions to address these findings, which would lead to either an expansion of the sites or the eventual closure. These orders lead to the completion of preliminary groundwater studies and landfill closure cost studies.

The studies estimated that it would cost the municipality \$435,000 to close the Scoble Landfill in 2018 and \$1,583,000 in 2029 to close the Sand Hill Landfill. We can assume the costs will be significantly higher than previously estimated.

Following the closure of a landfill site, municipalities are required to monitor the effluent leeching from the sites for 25 to 50 years. It is estimated that the cost of monitoring for two landfill sites will be about \$50,000 per year.

When these sites close, there is no guarantee that the province will approve a new site for a landfill and the municipality could be forced to truck waste to another landfill outside the municipality, which is more costly than running a landfill site. It can take ten or more years to select a site and obtain regulatory approvals for a new landfill site and the costs are more than our municipality can afford.

For these reasons, Council decided to apply to expand both landfill sites to add another 30 years of life. The work on the Scoble application was started first since it was already at capacity and once that was well underway, work began on the Sand Hill application. Since the MECP orders, it has **cost the** municipality nearly \$350,000 on studies and well monitoring in preparation to submit the expansion applications and there is still more work to be done.

In a typical year, the revenues from landfill tipping fees can be anywhere from \$6,000 to \$12,000. This doesn't come anywhere close to the annual operating costs for the landfill sites, which are nearly \$170,000.

Landfills are expensive, and we need to make them last as long as possible. Ideally, at least 100 years. To accomplish this, we need residents to be active participants in waste management. Bag limits encourage increased diversion which benefits the life of the landfill and the environment. Waste diversion puts materials back into the economy and supports jobs and most importantly will save tax dollars.

Please help extend the life of our landfill sites by minimizing waste and diverting materials where possible.

Please BAG your plastics and cans. Clear and blue bags are recommended. Bags help to keep the mountain of recycling much more manageable. Cardboard does not have to be bagged, only flattened.

Allergy Season is Upon Us: How to Prepare

As spring approaches, it's a reminder for those affected by seasonal allergies that allergy season is fast approaching. According to the Canadian Society of Allergy and Clinical Immunology (CSACI), about one-quarter of Canadians suffer from seasonal allergies.

What is an Allergy?

An allergy is a multifactorial condition influenced by both environmental and hereditary factors. It occurs when the immune system reacts to allergens (substances in the environment), resulting in an allergic reaction. The immune system produces an antibody called immunoglobulin E (IgE), which releases chemicals like histamine into the bloodstream. Histamine helps eliminate allergens, but also causes symptoms like sneezing, itching, hives, and watery eyes. While allergies can interfere with daily activities and cause frustration and fatigue, most cases are mild.

Common Allergens:

- Pollen: A fine, powdery substance produced by trees, grass, and weeds. In Canada, tree pollen peaks in spring (late April to May), grass and weed pollen peak in summer (late May to mid-July) and fall (mid-August to October).
- Mould: A type of fungus caused by excess water and humidity, often found in poorly ventilated areas like bathrooms and basements.
- Pet Dander: Flecks of dead skin shed by pets with fur or feathers, like dogs, cats, and birds. These particles float in the air and are the primary cause of pet allergies.
- Dust Mites: Microscopic bugs that thrive in humid, dust-prone environments, such as pillows, mattresses, carpets, and stuffed toys.

Allergy Symptoms:

Allergy symptoms can vary from person to person, and may develop within minutes or over several hours. Common symptoms include:

- Runny nose
- Sneezing
- Itchy nose, eyes, and roof of mouth
- Red, watery eyes
- Nasal congestion, leading to headaches
- Pressure in the nose and cheeks
- Ear fullness and popping
- Postnasal drip

Did You Know?

- Respiratory allergies, like allergic rhinitis, affect 1 in 5 Canadians.
- 80% of people with asthma also suffer from allergic rhinitis or sinusitis.
- Allergies can impact your quality of life at work, school, and play.
- Allergic rhinitis and sinusitis are linked to more severe or frequent asthma symptoms.
- 75% of asthma patients also have seasonal allergies.
- Allergies and asthma often overlap, as many of the same allergens trigger both conditions.
- Seasonal allergies can worsen asthma and may be a risk factor for its development.
- Proper management of allergies can reduce asthma symptoms and may even prevent the onset of asthma.

Medications:

Common medications to help manage allergies include Claritin, Benadryl, Reactine, Allegra, and Aerius, among others. If you have asthma and seasonal allergies, be sure to carry both your asthma inhalers and allergy medication with you to ensure your safety.
