Extreme heat can be dangerous for everyone, but people who work outdoors, the elderly, some people with disabilities, and children, particularly infants, are more vulnerable.

Hazard Information

Extreme heat can make you sick with heat stroke, heat rash and/or heat cramps.

Safety Tips

If you feel dizzy, weak or overheated:

- · go to a cool place;
- sit or lie down;
- drink water;
- wash your face with cool water

If you don't feel better soon, seek medical help immediately.

If you are indoors:

- · stay indoors to limit sun exposure
- take frequent cool showers or baths
- stay on lower floors if there's no air conditioning
- drink water and eat light, regular meals avoid using salt

If you are outdoors:

- spend the hottest part of the day in air-conditioned buildings
- drink water every 15 to 20 minutes even if you aren't thirsty
- dress in light-coloured, loose-fitting clothing covering as much of your skin as possible
- · wear a wide-brimmed hat to protect your face
- wear full UVA and UVB protection sunglasses
- apply sunscreen with SPF 15 or higher 20 minutes before going outside
- apply lip balm with an SPF 15 or higher

Prepare Now

Take the following steps so you and your family are prepared in the event of an emergency:

- cover windows that receive morning or afternoon sun with drapes, shades or awnings
- include extra water, sunscreen and sunglasses (with full UVA and UVB protection) in your emergency survival kit

EMERGENCY TEXT ALERT SERVICE for Neebing Residents



Sign up for Neebing's Emergency Text Alert Service. This text alert service is used to notify our residents <u>via text message</u> of immediate dangers or emergencies occurring in our community such as evacuations, road closures, forest fires and other hazards. Sign up is free but you must have a smartphone equipped to receive text messages to use this service as it does not work on land lines.

Highway 61 Project Updates

Road shoulder improvements, and guardrail and culvert replacements are continuing. Additional gravel is required to improve the shoulders before re-paving occurs. Fire Safety - You Can't JULY It!

July is finally here – the height of summer and summer activities. July is a month where we celebrate our country with family and friends, games, and of course, fireworks!

A long-lasting tradition for the celebration of Canada Day is fireworks. Neebing Emergency Services would like to remind you to practice firework safety while having fun this Canada Day. Make sure when purchasing fireworks, to buy from a reliable source that sells products which meet safety standards. NEVER improvise or make fireworks on your own. Fireworks should only be handled by those over 18 years of age, and make sure to read all instructions and safety warnings prior to use. Fireworks should always be set up outside and on a hard, flat and level surface, away from any buildings and anything that could catch fire. Supervise all children during any events involving fireworks and make sure all spectators are a safe distance away. It is important to never re-light a dud or defective firework or hold any lit firework in your hand. Anytime fireworks are in use, make sure to have a bucket of sand, water, and a fire extinguisher on hand. As per municipal bylaw, the site must be inspected, and a permit must be issued by the NES Fire Chief prior to use of fireworks.

Our Emergency First Response team would like to highlight the importance of staying hydrated during your summer activities. Keeping a high enough water intake is essential for preventing dehydration. Dehydration has severe and sometimes fatal consequences if not treated. Some signs of dehydration include thirst, dry mouth, not urinating or dark coloured urine, dry and cool skin, headache, and muscle cramps.

Heat illness is another common risk during the summer months. This can include heat rash, heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heatstroke. It is important to stay hydrated and seek shade when possible. Wear long and light clothing and apply sunscreen to prevent sunburns, which can contribute to heat illness. Signs of heatstroke include confusion or dizziness, nausea or vomiting, rapid and strong pulse, and ceasing sweating. If any signs of heatstroke present, call 911.

A quick reminder that Neebing Emergency Services is a volunteer department which mean many of our fire fighters and emergency first response personnel respond using flashing green lights. It is imperative that that you make room so we can reach the emergency as soon as possible. We thank you again for your support.

Firework Safety Tips

- √ Ensure you are in possession of a firework permit, issued by the NES Fire Chief.
- √ Purchase from a reliable source that sells fireworks meeting safety standards.
- $\sqrt{\text{NEVER}}$ make your own fireworks.
- $\sqrt{\text{Read}}$ the instructions before use,
- $\sqrt{\text{Set up outside on a hard, flat and level surface}}$.
- √ Ensure all spectators are a safe distance from any fireworks.
- √ Check the wind direction before use and make sure any spectators are upwind of fireworks.
- $\sqrt{\text{Have a bucket of sand}}$, water, and a fire extinguisher on hand.





Be 'Bear Wise' and Prevent Bear Encounters

Who to contact

Not every bear sighting is an emergency situation. Here is who to call if you encounter a bear.

Emergency situations

• Call 911 or your local police if a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety and exhibits threatening or aggressive behavior, such as:

oenters a school yard when school is in session

ostalks people and lingers at the site

oenters or tries to enter a residence

owanders into a public gathering

okills livestock/pets and lingers at the site

• Police will respond first to an emergency situation, but may request assistance from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry during daylight hours.

Non-emergency encounters

• Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 (TTY 705-945-7641) if a bear:

oroams around or checks garbage cans

obreaks into a shed where garbage or food is stored

ois in a tree

opulls down a bird feeder or knocks over a barbecue omoves through a backyard or field but does not linger

• This line operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, from April 1 to November 30.

If you encounter a black bear

When bears are caught off guard, they are stressed, and usually just want to flee. Stop. Do not panic. Remain calm. Generally, the noisier the bear is, the less dangerous it is, provided you do not approach. The noise is meant to "scare" you off and acts as a warning signal.

DO

- Slowly back away while keeping the bear in sight and wait for it to leave.
- If the bear does not leave, throw objects, wave your arms and make noise with a whistle or air horn.
- Prepare to use bear spray.
- If you are near a building or vehicle get inside as a precaution.
- Drop any food you may be carrying and slowly move away.
- If a bear is in a tree, leave it alone. Leave the area. The bear will come down when it feels safe.

DO NOT

- Run, climb a tree or swim.
- Kneel down.
- Make direct eye contact.
- Approach the bear to get a better look.
- Attempt to feed a bear.

Bear warning signs

Black bear attacks are extremely rare. A threatened or predatory black bear will give off warning signs to let you know you are too close. A black bear standing on its hind legs is not a sign of aggressive behavior. The bear is trying to get a better look at you or catch your scent.

A defensive bear

A bear that feels threatened will:

- salivate excessively and exhale loudly
- make huffing, moaning, clacking and popping sounds with its mouth, teeth and jaws
- lower its head with its ears drawn back while facing you
- charge forward, and/or swat the ground with its paws (known as a 'bluff' charge)

 A predatory bear

The bear will approach silently, usually in rural or remote areas, and may continue to approach regardless of your attempts to deter them by yelling or throwing rocks. If the bear attacks:

- use bear spray
- fight back with everything you have
- do not play dead unless you are sure a mother bear is attacking in defense of her cubs
