What’s Been Happening at Council Meetings

Be ‘Bear Wise’ and Prevent Bear Encounters

WHO TO CONTACT

Not every bear sighting is an emergency situation. Here is who to call if you encounter a bear.

Emergency situations

- Call 911 or your local police if a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety and exhibits threatening or aggressive behavior, such as:
 - enters a school yard when school is in session
 - stalks people and lingers at the site
 - enters or tries to enter a residence
 - wanders into a public gathering
 - kills livestock/pets and lingers at the site
- Police will respond first to an emergency situation, but may request assistance from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry during daylight hours.

Non-emergency encounters

- Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 (TTY 705-945-7641) if a bear:
 - roams around or checks garbage cans
 - breaks into a shed where garbage or food is stored
 - is in a tree
 - pulls down a bird feeder or knocks over a barbecue
 - moves through a backyard or field but does not linger
- This line operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, from April 1 to November 30.

IF YOU ENCOUNTER A BLACK BEAR

- When bears are caught off guard, they are stressed, and usually just want to flee.
- Stop. Do not panic. Remain calm. Generally, the noisier the bear is, the less dangerous it is, provided you do not approach. The noise is meant to “scare” you off and acts as a warning signal.

DO

- Slowly back away while keeping the bear in sight and wait for it to leave.
- If the bear does not leave, throw objects, wave your arms and make noise with a whistle or air horn.
- Prepare to use bear spray.
- If you are near a building or vehicle get inside as a precaution.
- Drop any food you may be carrying and slowly move away.
- If a bear is in a tree, leave it alone. Leave the area. The bear will come down when it feels safe.

DO NOT

- Run, climb a tree or swim.
- Kneel down.
- Make direct eye contact.
- Approach the bear to get a better look.
- Attempt to feed a bear.

BEAR WARNING SIGNS

Black bear attacks are extremely rare. A threatened or predatory black bear will give off warning signs to let you know you are too close. A black bear standing on its hind legs is not a sign of aggressive behavior. The bear is trying to get a better look at you or catch your scent.

A defensive bear

- A bear that feels threatened will:
 - salivate excessively and exhale loudly
 - make huffing, moaning, clacking and popping sounds with its mouth, teeth and jaws
 - lower its head with its ears drawn back while facing you
 - charge forward, and/or swat the ground with its paws (known as a ‘bluff’ charge)

A predatory bear

- The bear will approach silently, usually in rural or remote areas, and may continue to approach regardless of your attempts to deter them by yelling or throwing rocks. If the bear attacks:
 - use bear spray
 - fight back with everything you have
 - do not play dead unless you are sure a mother bear is attacking in defense of her cubs

Staying Safe This Summer

Summer is a great time to get outdoors, stay active, and enjoy the warmer weather. However, it’s important to take a few extra precautions to stay safe and healthy during the hot months.

Stay Cool and Hydrated

Drink plenty of water throughout the day, even if you don’t feel thirsty. Try to stay indoors during the hottest part of the day (typically between 11:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.), and use fans or air conditioning to keep cool.

Protect Yourself from the Sun

Wear lightweight, light-coloured clothing, a wide-brimmed hat, and sunglasses when outdoors. Use sunscreen with at least SPF 30 and reapply regularly, especially if you are outside for extended periods.

Watch for Signs of Heat-Related Illness

Be aware of symptoms like dizziness, nausea, headache, or confusion. If you start to feel unwell, move to a cool place, drink water, and seek medical attention if symptoms persist

Stay Connected

Check in regularly with friends, family, or neighbours, especially during heat waves. A quick call can make a big difference.

Be Bug-Smart

Use insect repellent to protect against mosquitoes and ticks when spending time outside. Wear long sleeves and pants when in wooded or grassy areas.

Keep Active—Safely

Walking, gardening, and light outdoor activities are excellent ways to stay active. Try to schedule activities in the early morning or evening when temperatures are cooler.

Taking a few simple precautions can help ensure a safe, enjoyable summer. Stay cool, stay connected, and make the most of the season!



Why Flexible Plastics Go in the Same Bin as Paper & Cardboard

You may have noticed that flexible plastics, like grocery bags, bread bags, and food wrappers, are collected in the same bin as paper and cardboard. At first glance,

this might seem confusing. After all, plastic and paper are very different materials!

So why are they grouped together?

It’s All About Shape, Not Just Material

In recycling, items are often sorted based on how they behave in the sorting equipment, not just what they’re made of.

Flexible plastics and paper/cardboard have something important in common:

> They are both flat and lightweight (called “2D materials”)

Examples of 2D materials:

- Paper and envelopes
- Cardboard and boxboard
- Plastic bags and wrappers

Because they move similarly on conveyor belts, they can be processed together in the first stage of sorting. For this reason, flexible plastics are placed in the fibre bin.

Why Proper Sorting Matters

Putting materials in the wrong recycling bin is considered contamination because it disrupts the sorting process and reduces the quality of recyclable materials. Recycling systems are designed to separate specific types of items, such as paper, cardboard, and flexible plastics, based on how they move through equipment and how they can be processed.

When incorrect items are mixed in, they can be misidentified, damage machinery, or contaminate entire batches of otherwise recyclable material. This can lead to more materials being rejected and sent to landfill, even if some items were placed in the bin with good intentions.

In short, using the correct bin helps ensure materials can be properly sorted, processed, and turned into new products.

How You Can Help

A few simple steps make a big difference:

- ✓ Keep recyclables clean and dry
- ✓ Empty food and liquids
- ✓ Place items loose in the bin (not

What Happens When You Call 911?

Have you ever wondered what happens when you call for help? This article will walk you through what you can expect during a 911 emergency call and how help is dispatched.

Step 1: Call 911 First

When you call 911, your call is answered by a trained emergency dispatcher. Their job is to quickly determine what type of emergency response is needed and send help as fast as possible.

The dispatcher will:

- 1. Ask which service you need—police, fire, or ambulance
- 2. Connect or coordinate your call with the appropriate emergency responders
- 3. Ask important questions to understand the situation and ensure the right help is dispatched immediately

Even if you are unsure of what is happening, stay on the line. The dispatcher will guide you through the entire process.

If You Accidentally Call 911 do not hang up! Stay on the line and explain the mistake. This helps prevent unnecessary emergency resources from being dispatched to check on your wellbeing.

Step 2: Stay Calm and Follow Instructions

Calling 911 often happens during moments of stress, fear, or confusion. It is important to remember that the dispatcher’s questions are not delays—they are how help is directed to you quickly and safely.

Your role is simple: answer clearly and honestly.

Important tips while on the call:

- Do not hang up until the dispatcher tells you to
- Follow all instructions carefully (they may guide you through CPR or safety steps)
- Put your phone on speaker if you need your hands free
- Stay as calm as possible and answer directly
- If the situation changes, update the dispatcher immediately

Step 3: Getting Help on the Way

One of the most important questions you will be asked is: “What is the address?”

This is essential—emergency responders cannot be sent without a location.

Once the address is confirmed and the situation is understood; emergency services are dispatched immediately. The dispatcher may continue providing instructions until help arrives.

Neebing Emergency Services Response

For medical emergencies, the closest ambulance will be dispatched to your location. In addition, you may also see a Neebing Emergency Services first response team arrive on scene.

These responders are dispatched as part of pre-ambulatory care for high-acuity medical calls. They may arrive in personal vehicles, fire department rescue units, or fire trucks. This is normal—these responders are there to provide immediate assistance until, or alongside, paramedics.

For fire-related emergencies and other incidents such as weather events or downed power lines, Neebing Emergency Services also responds and coordinates with other agencies as needed, including hydro and gas utilities.

Members of the department are spread throughout the community. These are not staffed stations; instead, responders are on-call and alerted through pagers, radios, and mobile systems. At any time—whether at home, at work, with family, or asleep—they respond immediately by heading to the hall, gearing up, and responding to the emergency.

Neebing Emergency Services is committed to supporting the community in times of need and remains ready to respond at all times.

Whether the emergency is medical, fire-related, or another urgent situation, remember that help is only a phone call away. From the dispatcher answering your call to the responders arriving on scene, an entire system is working together to assist you when you need it most.

Wildfire Safety Starts at Home

As we move into the warmer months, Neebing residents are encouraged to take steps now to reduce the risk of wildfires on their properties and throughout our community. Northwestern Ontario is no stranger to wild-fire activity, and periods of hot, dry, and windy weather can create conditions where fires spread quickly and unpredictably.

While large forest fires often capture public attention, many fires begin from everyday activities close to home. Unattended campfires, improperly extinguished burn piles, discarded smoking materials, sparks from equipment, and even backyard fire pits can become sources of ignition when conditions are dry. The good news is that wildfire prevention starts with simple actions that every property owner can take.

Reduce Fire Hazards Around Your Home

One of the most effective ways to protect your home is to create a safer space around buildings by reducing combustible materials.

Residents should:

- Keep grass cut and remove dead vegetation regularly.
- Clear leaves, pine needles, and other debris from around structures, decks, sheds, and under porches.
- Trim tree branches that overhang roofs or are close to buildings.
- Remove dead trees and fallen branches from your property when possible.
- Keep woodpiles, fuel containers, propane tanks, and other flammable materials a safe distance from homes and outbuildings.

A well-maintained property not only reduces the chance of a fire starting, but it can also help slow the spread of a fire and improve firefighter access if an emergency occurs.

Burn Responsibly

Outdoor burning remains one of the most common causes of preventable fires.

Before lighting any fire:

- Check current fire restrictions, fire bans, and local regulations BEFORE you burn
- Never burn during windy conditions.
- Keep fires within the regulations of your fire permit
- Have a water source, hose, or extinguisher readily available.
- Never leave a fire unattended, even for a few minutes.

When you are finished, thoroughly extinguish the fire with water and stir the ashes until everything is cool to the touch. If it is too hot to touch, it is too hot to leave. Remember that a fire that appears to be out can reignite hours later under the right conditions.

Be Prepared for Emergencies

Wildfires can develop quickly, especially during periods of extreme weather. Every household should have a basic emergency plan.

Take time to:

- Discuss evacuation routes with family members.
- Identify a meeting location if family members become separated.
- Prepare an emergency kit with essential supplies such as water, medications, flashlights, batteries, important documents, and basic first-aid items.
- Keep vehicles fueled and ready if evacuation becomes necessary.

Being prepared before an emergency occurs can reduce stress and allow you to act quickly if conditions change.

Help Emergency Responders Help You

Make sure your civic address sign is clearly visible from the road and not blocked by trees, vegetation, snowbanks, or other obstacles. Emergency responders rely on accurate and visible addressing to locate properties quickly.

Ensure driveways remain accessible for emergency vehicles and that gates can be opened when needed.

As wildfire season continues, Neebing Emergency Services encourages all residents to remain vigilant and practice fire safety every day. Prevention remains our best defense against wildfire.

Together, we can help keep Neebing safe.



EMERGENCY TEXT ALERT SERVICE for Neebing Residents

Sign up for Neebing’s Emergency Text Alert Service. This text alert service is used to notify our residents **via text message** of immediate dangers or emergencies occurring in our community such as road closures, evacuations, wildland fires, and other hazards.

Sign up is free but you must have a smart-phone equipped to receive text messages to use this service as it does not work on land lines. 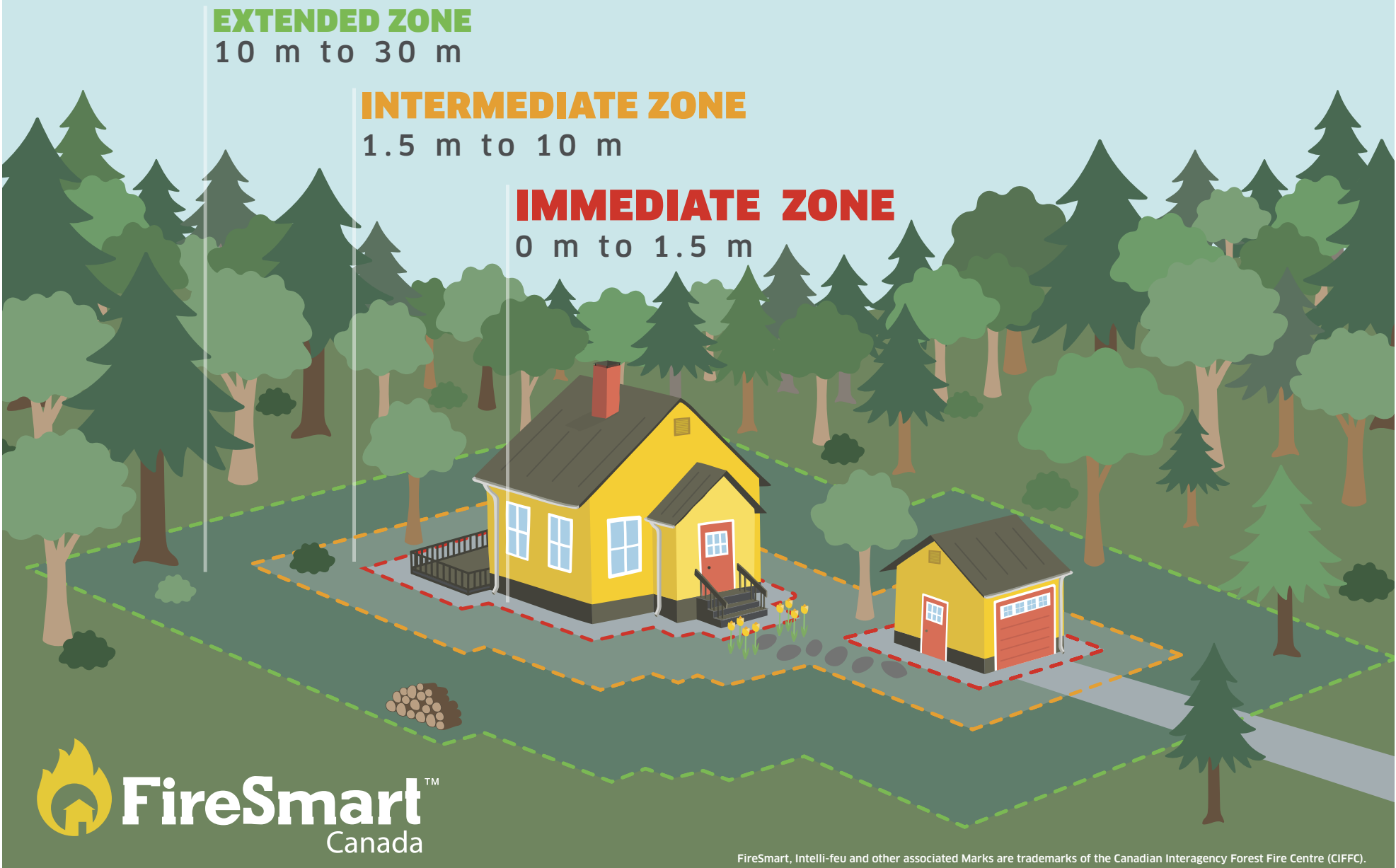

IMMEDIATE ZONE

0m to 1.5m

- The Immediate Zone is a non-combustible area that starts at the house and extends to a 1.5 metre perimeter around the home and attached structures, including decks. Reduce the chance of wind-blown embers igniting your home by starting with these proactive steps:
- Choose non-combustible building materials when constructing or renovating your home.
 - Clear vegetation and combustible material down to mineral soil and cover with non-combustible materials like gravel, brick, or concrete.
 - Avoid planting woody shrubs or trees. If any are present, prune and maintain them regularly.

INTERMEDIATE ZONE

1.5m to 10m

- Elements in the Intermediate Zone are managed so they don’t transmit fire to your home. Here are a few actions you can take to reduce your home’s vulnerability:
- Plant fire-resistant vegetation and select non-combustible landscaping materials.
 - Avoid incorporating any woody debris, including mulch.
 - Keep combustible items like firewood piles, construction materials, patio furniture, tools, and decorative pieces out of this zone.
 - Move trailers, recreational vehicles, storage sheds, and other combustible structures into the Extended Zone. If that is not possible, store firewood inside your mitigated garage, shed, or other ember-resistant structures.
 - Create a non-combustible ground cover, like a gravel pad, underneath and 1.5 metres around trailers, recreational vehicles, and sheds.

EXTENDED ZONE

10m to 30m

- The goal in the Extended Zone is not to eliminate fire, but to reduce its intensity. If your property extends into this zone, a few important steps you can take include:
- Selectively remove evergreen trees to create at least 3 metres of horizontal space between the single or grouped tree crowns.
 - Remove all branches to a height of 2 metres from the ground.
 - Regularly clean up accumulations of fallen branches, dry grass, and needles to eliminate potential surface fuels.
 - Continue to apply these principles if your property extends beyond 30m. Work with your neighbours in overlapping zones and seek guidance of a forest professional if affected by other conditions, like steep slopes.

KEY ISSUES:

Living where wildfires can occur puts our homes at risk, but it is possible to live safely and resiliently with wildfire. The choices we make about our homes and properties – out to 100 metres from the foundation – can greatly reduce vulnerability to wildfire.



What factors contribute to the vulnerability of your yard?

- Storing items such as firewood piles, construction materials, patio furniture, tools and decorative pieces against or near a house is a major fire hazard.
- If combustible landscaping mulch ignites, it can produce embers that may ignite combustible materials and increase the chance of direct flame spreading to the home.
- Evergreen trees (with cones and needles) are highly flammable and should not be within 10 metres of your home.

Consider these guidelines when planning updates to your yard and as part of your ongoing property maintenance:

- A 1.5 metre non-combustible surface should extend around the entire home and any attachments, such as decks, to reduce the chance of wind-blown embers igniting materials near your home.
- Use non-combustible materials such as gravel, brick, or concrete in this critical 1.5 metre area adjacent to your home. Woody shrubs, trees or tree branches should be avoided in this area; any that are present should be properly mitigated.
- Plant only a few fire-resistant plants and shrubs within 10 metres of your home.
- Do not use bark or pine needle mulches within 10 metres of your home as they are highly combustible. Gravel mulch and decorative crushed rock mulch significantly reduce the risk of wildfire.
- A mowed lawn is a fire resistant lawn. Grasses shorter than 10 centimetres in height are less likely to burn intensely.
- Move firewood piles, stored trailers/recreational vehicles, storage sheds, and other combustible materials a minimum of 10 metres from your home.
- Regularly clean up accumulations of fallen branches, dry grass and needles from the ground to eliminate potential surface fuels.
- Remove all branches to a height of 2 metres from the ground on evergreen trees that are within 30 metres.

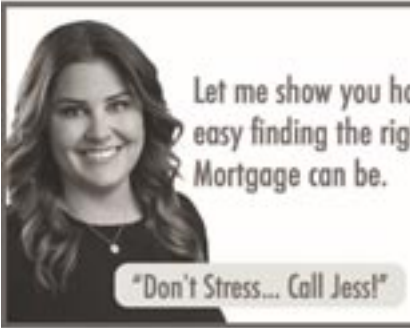

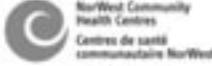

Are you ready to Evacuate?

Your neighbourhood is under an evacuation notice and you need to be ready to evacuate in 2 hours. Would you know what to do or where to go? Do you know what action to take and where to turn for more information on the unfolding emergency?

In Neebing, the Emergency Control Group (the ECG) functions as necessary to minimize the effects of an emergency or disaster. It is the ECG that makes the decision to evacuate, which routes would be safest to take, and where to set up a registration/reception centre for those displaced by an evacuation.

A press release containing the evacuation information would be relayed to radio and TV stations for broadcast, sent out through the Neebing Text Alert System, and posted to the municipal Facebook page and website.

Neebing Emergency Services volunteers along with other community volunteers assisted by the Ontario Provincial Police, would enter the evacuation zone armed with handouts containing vital information about the impending evacuation. The volunteers would be going door to door to warn residents.

Residents who have their own transportation would be asked to follow specific instructions and adhere to the designated evacuation routes. The Municipality would arrange transportation for those who are unable to transport themselves through volunteers and service agencies, but neighbours would be expected to assist neighbours in that regard.

Evacuees would be asked to attend and register at the designated registration/reception centre for more information and assistance as required. Residents would be encouraged to stay with family/friends or seek hotel/motel accommodation in neighbouring municipalities.

The best thing you can do for yourself, and your family, is to be prepared BEFORE an emergency occurs. Know the risks, make an emergency plan, have an emergency kit.

Emergency Management Ontario (EMO) has an excellent website chock full of valuable emergency preparedness information. The Municipality also has EMO printed materials available to you for free. Come by the Municipal Office and pick some up.

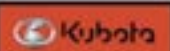
