Neebing Landfill News

Summer Landfill Hours Start April Ist

Saturdays: 9:00 am to 5:00 pm Sundays & Wednesdays: 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm

Garbage Every bag of regular household garbage requires a Municipal Garbage Bag Tag. We issue a set amount of tags to residents on an annual basis. You can collect your tags at the municipal landfill sites during regular hours of operation. You MUST present photo ID to the attendant in order to receive your tags.

Recycling Yes we have a recycling program! We accept #1 through #7 plastics as well as carboard. View our recycling sorting guide to determine if your items are acceptable recycling materials. Please remember to BAG your cans and plastics and FLATTEN your cardboard. We do not accept plastic grocery bags.

What are Half-Load Restrictions?

Half-load restrictions are placed on roads during the spring thaw period because of the need to protect the road from being permanently damaged. When the ground thaws, the road-bed and surface becomes softer and weaker. Heavy loads can cause the road to sink and break apart, which can lead to permanent damage. To avoid rebuilding the roads after every spring thaw, which would cost a lot of taxpayer dollars, half-load restrictions give the roads time to properly shed the frost.

When half-load restrictions are active, larger vehicles such as dump trucks, delivery trucks, concrete trucks and heavy equipment floats or any vehicles over a certain weight class are either not permitted to use the roadway or must reduce their loads.

Due to variations in weather patterns, half-load restrictions are different every year and are not set for a specific length of time. This year half-loads began on March 9th. Half-loads are typically lifted sometime in June and you can check the Neebing website or phone the office for updated information.

Fire Permits are required for all open air burning in Neebing from April 1st to October 31st.




Neebing Residents: Report A Concern

VOLUNTEER FIRE CHIEF NEEBING EMERGENCY SERVICES

The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing is accepting applicants for the position of Volunteer Fire Chief. This is a volunteer part-time position but does include a monthly honourarium.

The incumbent will liaise with the Municipal Clerk-Treasurer and report directly to Council. The position is responsible for managing and directing approximately 45 volunteers consisting of Emergency First Responders, Firefighters, Fire Prevention staff and Officers and includes 5 fire stations and 10 fire apparatus. The successful candidate must possess advanced fire management, administrative and team building skills, and have the ability to manage in stressful situations.

Time requirement includes evening sessions, 24-hour callout and weekend work. A successful candidate is required to be in possession of a valid Ontario driver's license, preferably DZ or ability to obtain DZ license. This position requires planning and managing budgets, scheduling maintenance, acting as incident commander, completing performance reviews, council presentations, liaising with other municipal departments and other municipality's emergency services.

QUALIFICATIONS

- Advanced skills/expertise in applying knowledge of firefighting skills and techniques (minimum 5 years of experience, 2 years as an officer)
- Complete knowledge of relevant legislation and regulations including but not limited to, The Fire Code, Fire Protection and Prevention Act, Municipal Act, Forest Fire Prevention Act, O.H.S.A., Highway Traffic Act etc.
- Administrative/organizational/planning skills associated with the position of Fire Chief
- Strong presentation and training skills
- Advance knowledge in fire prevention, inspections and public fire education
- Ability and knowledge to perform fire investigation and scene control
- General knowledge of the first ressponse program
- Communicate tactfully and effectively with other emergency services, council, general public, and staff
- General computer skills required, oral and written communications in English
- Specialty ticket, college diploma or university degree in relevant field (preferred)
- History of NFPA level or equivalent Officer and Specialty Training, such as fire inspection, fire investigation, fire instruction, public education, and incident safety officer (preferred)
- Valid Ontario Class "DZ" drivers license or equivalent (preferred)

What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

Since the March edition, there have been two regular meetings of Council on March 6 and 20, 2024. There were also two special meetings of Council on March 6 and 20, 2024.

- At the special Council meeting on March 20th, the Committee of the Whole reviewed an application for severance of a property on Sturgeon Bay Road.


At the regular Council meeting on March 20th, the following matters were considered:

- Council authorized annual reserve fund transfers.
- Council awarded the tender for the improvements at the Blake Hall and Alf Olsen Rinks.
- Council reviewed a first draft of an aggressive dog by-law.

The next Council meetings will be held on April 3 and 17, 2024. Regular Council meetings are normally scheduled for the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month







I spend so much time in my car it's almost a second home. I end up eating a lot of meals and snacks there. I have lots of personal supplies handy. And on a cold snowy winter day (or spring day as the case may be) when I still have to be out and about, I appreciate the warmth and comfort of my car. Music, coffee, essential oil diffuser. I make it work! Not that I have a fancy car or anything. Or a clean car for that matter. Somehow my impeccable housekeeping skills in no way transfer to my car. Now, I'm married to a mechanic which means that many things in my life, including my car, are often held together with duct tape or other contraptions. There is usually at least one light on, on my dash. In fact I sometimes get worried when there are no lights on. It is the norm for me to hear things like 'don't worry about it' or 'just keep driving' or 'it's nothing important' when I bring potential mechanical issues to his attention. For one thing it's hard to identify the actual colour of my car. That comes with the territory when you live at the end of a long dirt road. There is no use in washing my car or heaven forbid spending money on a car wash in town. One drive back up the hill and it's back to being dirty again. I get a kick out of it when I see other 'country' cars on the road. You know the ones. Cars (or often trucks) that you know have a history. That have seen better days but probably have so many stories to tell if they could talk. I don't judge. Maybe there's a tail light missing. They probably never even had hubcaps. The antenna might be broken. A window might be stuck up or down or covered with plastic or even cardboard. They might have to open the door at the drive-thru. Forget about bluetooth or back-up cameras or other fancy features. There's probably a dog in the back. These are the people with the 'beater' cars that have been brought back to life and simply get you from point A to point B. Because the truth is not all of us can afford a brand new fresh off the lot vehicle, and I know I never will. And that's okay. Some of my best car memories involve old beaten up cars. From childhood outings to stock car races, to some of our own backcountry stock car adventures. I grew up a city kid but we had aunts and cousins in the country. Including older 'boy' cousins who were always taking us on adventures. They always had cars and always started to drive at a young age. We were mesmerized and always 'went along for the ride'. Nothing they had was really road-worthy but they were definitely 'field' worthy. There is nothing quite like racing around a back road or farmer's field in a hot-wired car with no windows, getting wacked with the occasional tree branch, inhaling various bugs, sitting on the bench seat in the back and hanging on for dear life to that 'rope' that hung across the seat in front of you (never was quite sure what that was for) while an older and probably too young to drive legally cousin showed his city slicker guests what real fun was and scared the pants off us at the same time. Based on the number of giant boulders we swerved and missed and sometimes didn't, and the general insanity of it all, I'm not sure how we all survived. But we did. And we dared not show that we were afraid or tell our parents how totally hairy the rides were or they might not let us come back. Winter months we switched to snow machines and it was just as dangerous and exciting, nothing like we had ever experienced 'back in town' - which was only a half hour away but seemed like a whole different world! Not sure if it made me love or hate driving but the memories are forever. I didn't get my driver's license till I was in my 20's (living in Toronto it's just not necessary) and didn't have my first car till I moved to the country myself in my 30's. I can't help but think it's all connected somehow. Country driving continues to be one of my favourite things (though I stick to the roads now!) Whether it's driving from Slate River to town once or twice a day, or country drives to Murillo or Hymers or other destinations to run errands.

When the weather cooperates and you have the right snacks and the right co-pilot these mini road trips can be simply the best and I never say no when the opportunity arises! Stay safe on the roads everyone, and no matter how fancy or not fancy your car is, make memories and embrace the ride!



APRIL – LET'S SPRING INTO FIRE SAFETY!

As the little snow we have begins to melt, it is a reminder that spring is just around the corner, and warmer days are not far from us.

The start of spring marks the start of fire season, beginning April 1, 2024. As of April 1, fire permits are now required until October 31, 2024, and restricted burning hours are effective immediately. NO DAY TIME **BURNING** is now in effect, and the ignition of fires can take place no sooner than two hours before sunset and must be extinguished two hours after sunrise. Burn permits are available 24/7 online at neebing@neebing.org or at the **Neebing** Municipal office during regular 9-5 business hours. If you are experiencing difficulty obtaining a permit contact the office at 807 474-5331 for assistance.

With our lack of precipitation this winter, the ground and foliage remain significantly more dry than previous years. It is important to keep in mind the risk this presents in regard to forest fires. As presented by FireSmart Canada, you can protect your home using the Home Ignition Zone guidelines. guideline consists of four zones to help protect your home from a potential wildfire.

Starting with Zone 3 (30-100 meters away from your home), look for opportunities to create a gap in foliage which creates a fire break and can help stop the spread of fire. This is done by clearing brush to create spaces between trees.

In Zone 2 (10-30 meters away from your home), thin evergreen trees by selecting and removing to create spaces of 3 meters apart. Remove any branches within 2 meters of the ground of the remaining evergreen

In **Zone 1** (1.5-10 meters away from the home), manage your landscape to ensure it is fire resistant. Plant fire-resistant plants and ensure they are spread out. Although mulch provides a finished look to shrubs and gardens, it is a significant fire hazard and can lead a wildfire right to your home. With Neebing being a remote community, it is common to have outdoor woodstoves and indoor fireplaces. Any stacked wood should be moved into Zone 2 and kept away from any outdoor woodstoves.

The Non-Combustible Zone (0-1.5 meters away from your home), should be cleared of any vegetation down to the soil. Placing things like lock stone, bricks, gravel or concrete can help add to the Non-Combustible Zone and ensure

no embers will catch near your home. A reminder this month that Neebing Emergency Services is a volunteer service Although

we do re-

spond in our marked Neebing emergency vehicles, many of us respond in personal vehicles which marked with **GREEN FLASH-**ING LIGHTS. If you see a vehicle with green flashing lights and/or hazards, please slow down and pull over to allow us to respond as quickly as possible. This simple step could save a life. Every second counts.
