What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

What's Been Happening at Council meetings?

Since the May edition, there have been two regular meetings of Council on May 1 and 15, 2024. There were also three special meetings of Council on May 1, 8 and 15, 2024.

At the special Council meeting on May 1st, Council discussed matters related unopened road allowance beyond the end of Podres Road East with impacted property owners.

At the regular Council meeting on May 1st, the following matters were considered:

- Council heard a deputation from Blue Sky Group relating to the use of Blake Hall.
- Council authorized participation in another FoodCycler pilot if more funding is available.
- Council approved a sponsorship for an artist to participate in an art show.
- Council appointed a new acting Fire Chief.
- Council passed a by-law to amend the trailer licensing by-law to strengthen enforcement provisions.

At the special Council meeting on May 8th, reviewed the results of the Citizen Satisfaction Survey.

At the special Council meeting on May 15th, the Committee of the Whole reviewed an application for severance of a property on Seed Road. At the regular Council meeting on May 15th, the following matters were considered:

- Council approved the recommendations from the Committee of the Whole to approve the application for severance of a property on Seed Road.
- Council scheduled the summer Council meetings for July 10, 2024 and August 7, 2024.
- Council directed Administration to schedule a proposed Indigenous craft event.
- Council directed Administration to submit delegation requests to various provincial Ministers for the AMO Conference.
- Council approved participation in joint discussions with area municipalities to search for opportunities to share services and resources related to fire and emergency response services.
- Council appointed a new Chief Building Official.

The next Council meetings will be held on May 5 and 19, 2024. Regular Council meetings are normally scheduled for the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month.

The minutes of each meeting are approved at the following meeting and are posted on the website once they have been approved and signed. If you don't have internet capabilities, you can always contact the office for copies of approved minutes.

Meeting agendas are always posted online on the Friday prior to the Wednesday meeting. Come out and see what your Council is doing on your behalf. Feel free to contact the Municipal Office for further information or with input into any of the items that Council is considering. The meetings are now being held at the Municipal Office, but there is the option to attend virtually as well. The links to login to the meetings are posted on our website in the calendar details.

Garbage Every bag of regular household garbage requires a Municipal Garbage Bag Tag. We issue a set amount of tags to residents on an annual basis. You can collect your tags at the municipal landfill sites during regular hours of operation. You MUST present photo ID to the attendant in order to receive your tags.

Please remember to BAG your cans and plastics and FLATTEN your cardboard. We do not accept plastic grocery bags.

Fire Safety – Morning, JUNE, and Night

June brings us into the full height of summer early sunrises and late sunsets, all the more time to enjoy the warm summer weather and all those summer activities. The pool covers are coming off and the lakes are finally warm enough to dip into on those hot summer days.

June is national safety month, and although we like to remind people yearround of important safety practices, it is a good time to do all of those routine checks if you haven't already done so. Check to ensure you have working CO and smoke alarms, fire extinguishers and are keeping your home fire smart. Practice your fire escape plan and ensure everyone in your home knows how to exit in case of a fire. Make sure all of your doors and windows are unobstructed for easy exit in case of a fire.

With the forest fire season in full effect, there are a few simple tips to make sure your home isn't at risk of catching fire. Clean your roof and gutters of any material that may catch fire such as leaves and other debris, and keep your porch and deck swept clean as this may easily catch fire and lead right to your home. Ensure to have fire preventative material expanding 5 feet surrounding your home and avoid things such as mulch or piling wood next to your house.

Summer is a popular time for new construction of buildings or renovations. While not common as yet residential sprinkler systems can bring exceptional levels of fire safety in your home and might be a sound safety consideration whether building your new home, or renovating your existing one. Sprinkler systems in your home are low profile, operate off your household water system, average as little as 2% of total construction cost and can help contain a fire to its area of origin and prevent fire spread to other parts of the home. Neebing Emergency Services would like to remind everyone this month that safety goes outside the realm of fire. The focus this month is water safety. Drowning can occur in seconds, is often silent and can happen to anyone. Keep these drowning prevention tips in mind and enjoy a safe summer:

It is a good safety measure to enclose your in-ground pool with a fence to prevent anyone from unintentionally falling in, especially if you have small children. If your children are swimming in your pool or the lake, ensure to supervise closely even in shallow water. It is good practice to make sure everyone knows the basics of swimming and water safety skills to prevent drowning. If unable to swim, make sure to wear a life jacket. Remember – life jackets are essential if boating regardless of swimming abilities. Everyone should wear a life jacket while on a watercraft. Try and avoid alcohol around open water as it can impair your ability to swim. Lastly, if possible, it is important for everyone to know how to perform CPR as it can save someone's life in the time it takes emergency services to arrive.

- Learn the basics of swimming and water safety.
- Supervise children closely while in water.
- Enclose pools with a fence to avoid children from falling in.
- Wear a life jacket, especially while on a watercraft regardless of swimming abilities.
- Avoid alcohol.
- Always swim with a buddy.

Three 30's 'Rule of Thumb' for Assessing Wildfire Danger Levels

In addition to available fuel and an ignition source being necessary to start a fire, wildfire danger levels are directly impacted by three weather factors: Wind, Humidity and Temperature. While it is important to take care and stay safe with all burning during the fire season a check of the weather forecast for your area can provide a quick reference of local fire danger levels:

If either the wind or temperature has a number greater > 30 or the humidity level is less than < 30 % no burning should take place.

- > WIND > 30 kph
- > TEMPEWRATURE > 30 C
- **HUMIDITY < 30 %**

If 2 or more readings are in the danger level restrict outdoor activities that may produce a spark or become a potential ignition source.

And remember:

Fire Permits are required in Neebing for all open and incinerator fires from April 1 - October 31, 2024. And,

> NO Daytime Burning is allowed in Neebing during the Fire Season.



Be 'Bear Wise' and **Prevent Bear Encounters**

Not every bear sighting is an emergency situation. Here is who to call if you encounter a bear.

Emergency situations

• Call 911 or your local police if a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety and exhibits threatening or aggressive behavior, such as:

oenters a school yard when school is in session ostalks people and lingers at the site oenters or tries to enter a residence owanders into a public gathering okills livestock/pets and lingers at the site

• Police will respond first to an emergency situation, but may request assistance from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry during daylight hours.

Non-emergency encounters

• Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 (TTY 705-945-7641) if a bear:

oroams around or checks garbage cans

obreaks into a shed where garbage or food is stored ois in a tree

opulls down a bird feeder or knocks over a barbecue omoves through a backyard or field but does not linger

• This line operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, from April 1 to November

If you encounter a black bear

When bears are caught off guard, they are stressed, and usually just want to flee. Stop. Do not panic. Remain calm. Generally, the noisier the bear is, the less dangerous it is, provided you do not approach. The noise is meant to "scare" you off and acts as a warning signal.

- Slowly back away while keeping the bear in sight and wait for it to leave.
- If the bear does not leave, throw objects, wave your arms and make noise with a whistle or air horn.
- Prepare to use bear spray.
- If you are near a building or vehicle get inside as a precaution.
- Drop any food you may be carrying and slowly move away.
- If a bear is in a tree, leave it alone. Leave the area. The bear will come down when it feels safe.

DO NOT

- Run, climb a tree or swim.
- Kneel down.
- Make direct eye contact.
- Approach the bear to get a better look.
- Attempt to feed a bear.

Bear warning signs

Black bear attacks are extremely rare. A threatened or predatory black bear will give off warning signs to let you know you are too close. A black bear standing on its hind legs is not a sign of aggressive behavior. The bear is trying to get a better look at you or catch your scent.

A defensive bear

A bear that feels threatened will:

- salivate excessively and exhale loudly
- make huffing, moaning, clacking and popping sounds with its mouth, teeth and
- lower its head with its ears drawn back while facing you
- charge forward, and/or swat the ground with its paws (known as a 'bluff' charge) A predatory bear

The bear will approach silently, usually in rural or remote areas, and may continue to approach regardless of your attempts to deter them by yelling or throwing rocks. If the bear attacks:

- · use bear spray
- fight back with everything you have
- do not play dead unless you are sure a mother bear is attacking in defense of her



Decisions, Decisions

Remember when we couldn't wait to be adults. We thought grown-ups had it all. They stayed up late. Ate what they wanted. Drove. We dreamed of the day we could 'adult' too. What were we thinking? Turns out adulting is hard. I'd give anything now for an early bedtime and afternoon naps. I would love it if someone told me to go to my room RIGHT NOW for a time out. Seriously, go ahead and ground me! And I would love to be chauffeured around the way my parents did when I was a kid while I played or napped in the back seat. You can even decide what I'm gonna eat if you're gonna cook it for me. Maybe it's about the decisions. As adults we have a bunch of decisions to make. Not all of them are significant. But they add up. If you have a spouse and family the number increases exponentially. Every single day. So many. Take food for instance. Multiple times a day I have to decide what we're going to eat. AND then I have to make it. And clean up afterwards. I love my life but the thought of having the means to hire someone to shop for me and prepare my meals from time to time is very appealing. And just think, when we were young we had just that. Our parents did the shopping, paid for it, and prepared the meals and all the decisions in between. Most of us never gave it a second thought. Then one day you find yourself all grown up and life suddenly throws you some extra speedy curve balls, and the decisions that need to be made seem to pile up and the weight of them feels crushing some days. And on those days the smaller more trivial decisions suddenly become particularly annoying. I have made deliberate attempts in my life to simplify the things I can. But I still have decisions to make throughout the day. So I've started to push back. Now when the Starbucks barista wants to know what brand of

And when the waitress wants to know if I want my eggs scrambled or over-easy I say 'surprise me'. Paper or plastic? You decide. A seat by the window? You decide. And I mean there are still decisions that only I can make and are important enough that I'm not leaving it up to strangers, but this new strategy has easily reduced my 'decision' load by 5-10 decisions a day sometimes. Instead I'm now putting them on someone else's plate. Usually someone getting paid for it. I am happy to give up some adulting in exchange for someone else taking the wheel from time to time - literally and figuratively. Gives my brain a chance to rest and recharge for the bigger more important decisions of life. Not that being a grown up is all that bad. There are things which I totally missed the boat on when I was a kid, but now as an adult I cherish more and more each day. Because these other delights, especially the ones that wrap around us here in the country, are pleasures I don't want to take for granted and if the trade off is having to be at least a little bit adult-ish some days, I'll oblige. 

In early 2015, we did our first craft show and continued to do craft/vendor shows whenever we could. T hen in 2016, I moved to a permanent location at the Thunder Bay Country Market still doing craft/vendor shows.

I continue to grow Randle's Candles Co. and many of the wonderful customers that I have met are more than just a customer. My candles are made with 100% all natural soy wax along with fragrance oils. I make tealights, melters, and 4oz, 6oz, and 9oz jar candles. I also make concrete candle containers and pour a candle into it.
